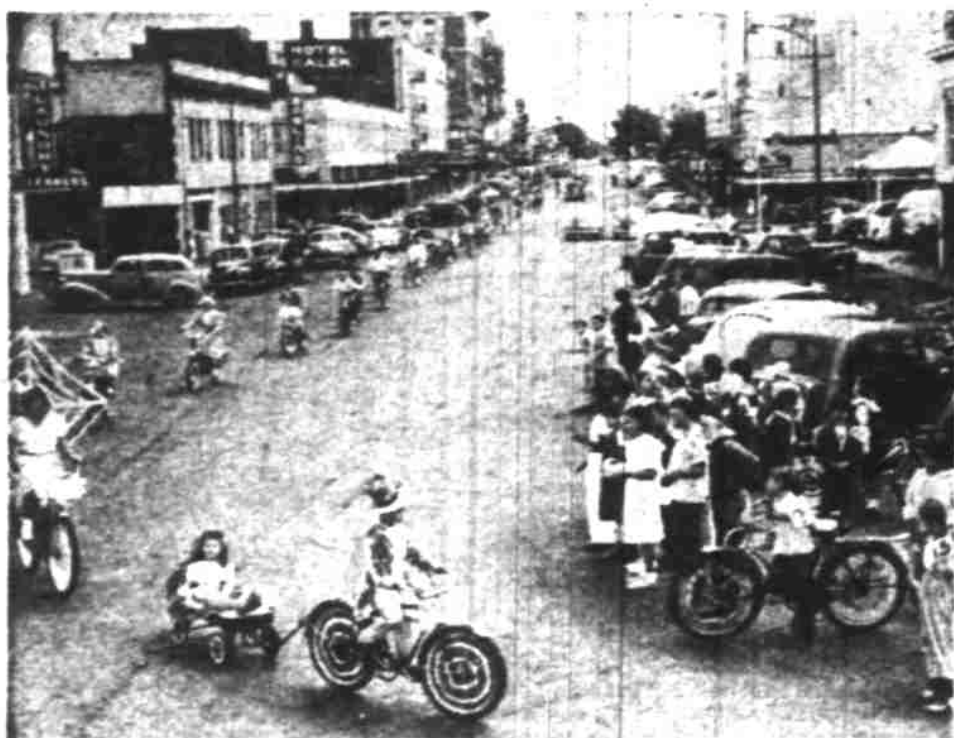


Bikes, Costumes of All Kinds in Safety Parade

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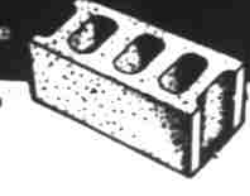
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Valley News Briefs

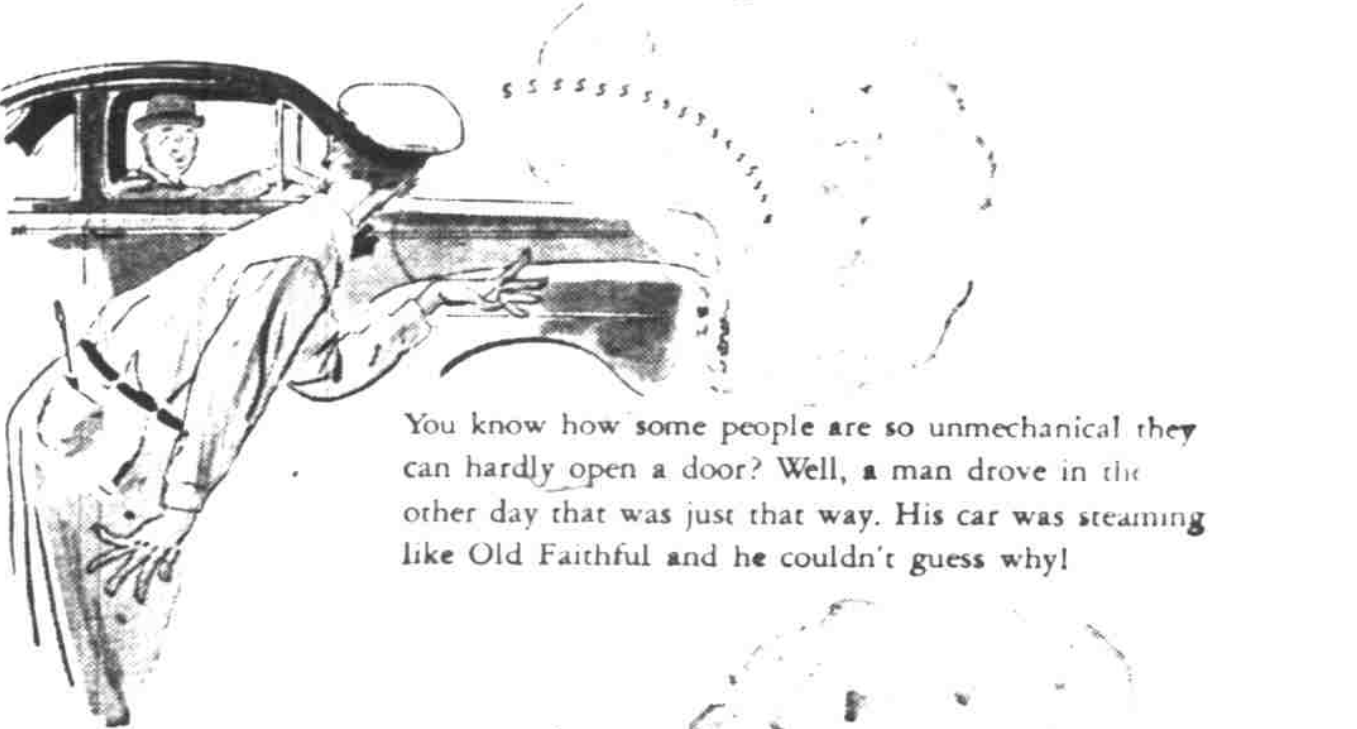


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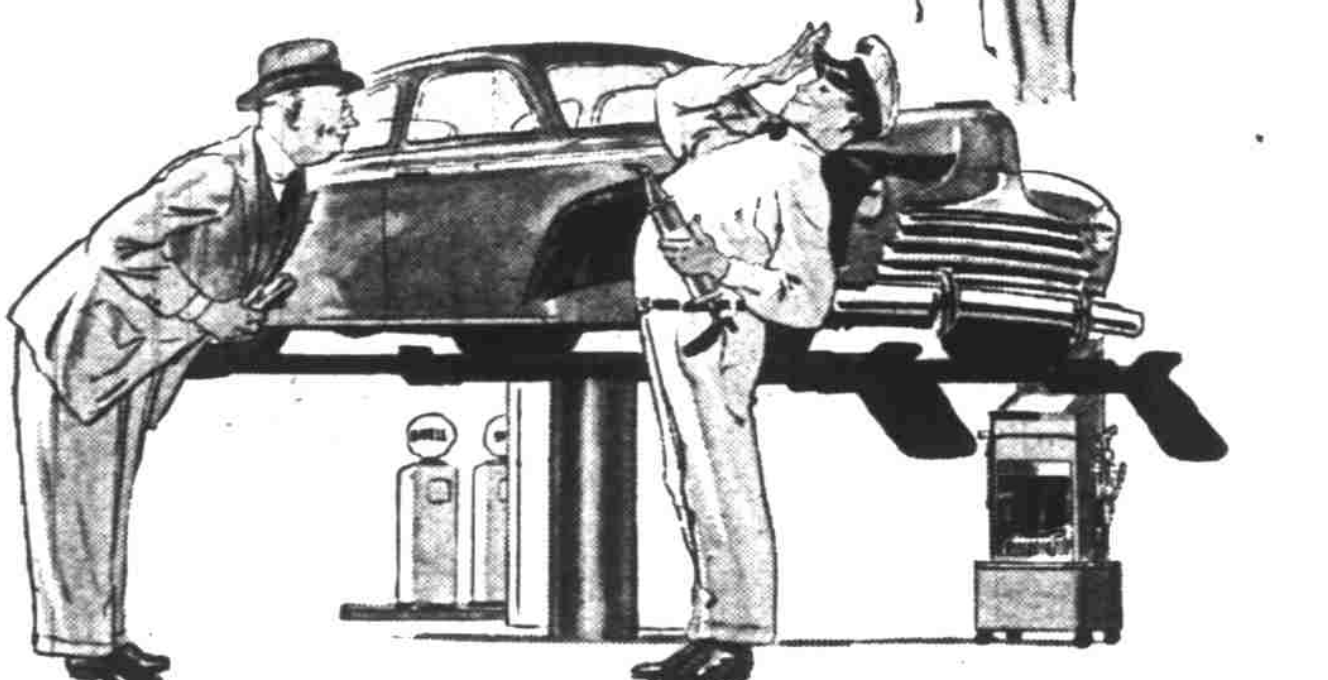


He was driving a tea kettle
