Schenk Heads Manufacturers Of California

Harry S. Schenk, Oregon assistant secretary of state for more than five years, has been appointed executive vice-president and general manager of the California Manufacturers' association, with headquarters in San Francisco, it became known Tuesday.

Schenk was named to the post by vote of the board of directors of the California association, one of the largest of its kind in the nation, and is to take over within the next few weeks. He succeeds Alvin E. Hewitt, who resigned to re-enter private industry, and will head the group's offices in San Francisco, Los Angeles and Sacramento.

He is now in Salem completing his affairs here and plans to return to San Francisco within 10 days. Mrs. Schenk and two children, Sally and Steven, will remain in Salem until a home is obtained in the San Francisco bay region.

Schenk, former associate professor in the University of Oregon journalism school, was manager of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' association for five years prior to appointment to the state position by the late Secretary of State Robert S. Farrel, Jr., in 1943. He resigned soon after Secretary of State Earl Newberry succeeded Farrel who died in a plane crash in southern Oregon last October 28.

The appointment was made known by Lloyd A. Johnson, president of the manufacturers' association and of National Motor Bearing company of Redmond City, Calif.

Good Walnut Crop Forecast: Heat Threat

Barring a few days of scorching heat, the walnut crop may be pretty fair this fall, J. J. Gallagher, manager of the Salem Nut Growers' association, says.

Last year, Gallagher recalled, the walnut crop was down 50 per cent from average. This year, he said, the crop, as it looks now, will be about 150 per cent of last year's. However, very hot weather might cause a heavy drop in nuts.

On the other hand, filbert orchards are showing poor promise, not more than 80 per cent of average. The filbert crop is more spotted than the walnut this season and a few growers are reporting a comparatively good crop while others are reporting scarcely any set at all. Only in a few instances have reports come back of no walnut at this year, Gallagher said.

Combined walnut and filbert orchards under the Salem Nut Growers association, a cooperative concern, has showing a little. Average itself has remained stationary for about six years with scarcely any trees being planted. But new orchards are coming into bearing each year now, bringing the acreage of production higher, the a-f-a manager said.

A federal marketing agreement and order to regulate handling of walnuts grown in California, Oregon and Washington has been recommended by the United States department of agriculture. This recommendation is based on evidence developed at a public hearing held in San Francisco the latter part of April.

Prospects for tree nut crops throughout the country were reported excellent in mid-June. Reports received so far on the foreign situation indicate about an average crop of filberts in Spain, but about one-fourth smaller than last year. The crop of almonds in Spain and Portugal is expected to be somewhat larger than last year but only slightly above average.

Spray Advised For Elm Trees

Elm trees, one of the country's most historic shade trees, must be given a protective lead arsenate spray now to protect them from elm beetle injury, D. L. Rasmussen, Marion county assistant agent, said Tuesday.

The most apparent damage is the skeletonized appearance of the leaves caused by the feeding of the larvae of the beetles on the under surface of the leaves.

Protecting the leaves with a thorough spray containing three pounds of lead arsenate plus a spreader sticker in 100 gallons of water should give control, Rasmussen said, adding that provided it is applied by a modern, high-pressure sprayer and used by experienced operators.
