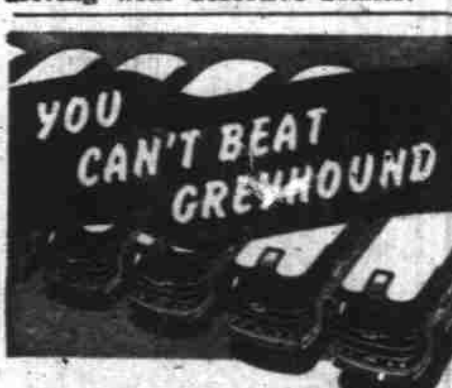
LEGION TICKETS ON SALE

'New Look' for Courthouse Recommended

The proposed new Marion county courthouse will definitely have the "new look" if recommendations of county department chiefs are put into effect by the building commission.

Marion County Clerk Harlan Judd said Monday that to date at least three offices, including his own, have submitted plans and specifications for their office requirements. Judd is secretary of the building commission and is charged with gathering recommendations from all offices and forwarding them to the commission.

An opportunity to establish a first class, efficient courtroom arrangement for circuit and district courts was taken into consideration by a committee which met last week. It consisted of Circuit Judges George Duncan and E. M. Page, District Judge Joseph Felton and Marion County Bar association members Walter Winslow and George Rinken.

They recommended an outlay of 13,140 square feet for four circuit court rooms, two district court rooms and extra rooms for reporters, secretaries, law library and other uses.

Jury Dormitory Planned
Two jury deliberation rooms and a dormitory for all-night juries are in the plans. Under the present set-up, if a jury must be kept all night, its members are taken to hotel rooms at county expense. The committee also noted that it is "of paramount importance" that juries be kept from contact with the public. Under the present system, juries are taken from the court room, down a public corridor, jammed into an elevator and taken to a top floor jury room.

Three of the proposed circuit courtrooms would be 25 by 40 feet while a fourth (capable of seating 200 spectators) will be 40 by 60 feet. Judge Duncan's present courtroom is 31 by 40 feet while Judge Page's is 31 by 18 feet.

With Law Library
It is also recommended in a memorandum drawn up by Judd Monday that the entire court outlay be on one floor with a law library centrally located.

The office of Marion County Superintendent of Schools, Mrs. Agnes Booth requests a section measuring 48 by 56 feet. It includes offices for the superintendent and two supervisors, an accounting room, supply and storage room, reception desk and waiting room.

For his own office, Judd requests 10,000 square feet of space. This, he said, would provide facilities to keep pace with the county's population for the next 20 or 30 years, estimated at double the present population.

One Large Room
His office would contain one large room to handle matters pertaining to district, county, circuit and probate courts, county commissioners court and registrar of elections and smaller rooms for supplies, abstractors and press.
