Hall Dissolves State Guard by Proclamation

Proclamation dissolving the Oregon state guard as of June 30 was issued by Gov. John H. Hall here Friday. Included in the action is Salem's company K, 12th battalion, under command of Lt. Col. Al J. Crose of Salem.

The state guard was organized by legislative authority following the induction of the Oregon National guard into federal service in September, 1940. The national guard is now reactivated and available for state service which was the purpose of the state guard during the war.

Col. Crose said Friday that most state guard officers are still in the reserve and can be called back by the governor on emergency. Enlisted men, he said, have been discharged.

Local Organization
The local organization of the state guard, Crose said, was made up of a rifle company, truck company, battalion headquarters company, a motorcycle patrol. Among highlights of local company's existence, he said was the modernization of the armory earlier this year. The work was completed through funds received by the state guard while it had charge of the armory. Officers of the guard here included, besides Crose, Lt. Col. Kenneth Graber, and Maj. Ira Pilcher, who was armory custodian.

In dissolving the state guard, Gov. Hall said he wished to commend the officers and men, both individually and collectively, for their unselfish and highly efficient service during the past seven years.

Uses Own Resources
"The state guard performed its duties with great credit and fulfilled its responsibilities without compensation and at considerable sacrifice," he said.

He added that, in many instances, members of the state guard used their own resources to purchase uniforms and equipment. Copies of the dissolution proclamation have been sent to state guard officials.

Mrs. Hoenig Named School Supervisor

One of the two recently-created vacancies in the Marion county rural school supervisor staff was filled Friday, reported Mrs. Agnes Booth, Marion county superintendent of schools.

The vacancies were caused by the resignation last week of Mrs. Vivian Hoenig and Mrs. Carmelitte Weddle, county school rural supervisors. The two resigned because the Marion county budget committee refused to grant their requested salary increases.

Mrs. Booth said Friday, however, that Mrs. Hoenig, who had been "second" supervisor, has accepted the position vacated by Mrs. Weddle. This still leaves a vacancy at Mrs. Hoenig's former position.

The new contract was offered Mrs. Hoenig by the county education board with the consent of the county court, Mrs. Booth reported.

Mrs. Weddle had sought a salary boost from \$250 to \$280 per month while Mrs. Hoenig requested an increase from \$240 to \$270. Each received a \$10 per month raise.

In accepting the new position Friday, Mrs. Hoenig will receive the advanced salary of \$280 per month originally granted Mrs. Weddle. Mrs. Weddle announced she will teach the eighth grade at Keiser school. She had been employed by the county school superintendent's office for 10 years.

Ens. Bradshaw Home on Leave

Ensign Fred Bradshaw spent a few days early this week with his parents, the F. O. Bradshaws, at their Chemeketa street home. He has been stationed in Tsingtau, China, for two years, on the destroyer Fred T. Berry, on which he has been chief engineer officer.

After a brief visit with his parents he left by plane Wednesday night for New London, Conn., where he will attend submarine school. Bradshaw, who graduated from Salem schools and attended Willamette university, graduated from Annapolis two years ago. He was home on leave from his duties last November.

432 Enrolled at Klamath School

Summer students at the Oregon vocational school at Klamath Falls now number 432, against the peak of 515, O. I. Paulson, state director of vocational education, announced here Friday.

The low enrollment was 35, a week after the institution opened in July, 1947. Paulson said it had been found necessary to place a restriction on the number of students due largely to a shortage of housing. He predicted an enrollment of slightly less than 550 when the fall term opens.

Renovation of Building to Add Cafe, Offices to Bus Terminal

West Coast Trailways announced Friday that its present bus depot at North High and Marion streets will be enlarged and remodeled into a modern, two-story building beginning July 10.

The plans were revealed by W. C. Simpson, Portland, company vice president and general traffic manager, who was in Salem with four other high Trailways officials. They were M. E. Moore, Dallas, Tex., president of all Trailways operations; James Emory, Dallas, national vice-president; Gene Allen, San Francisco, general manager of West Coast Trailways and Art Nay, Los Angeles, general manager of Santa Fe Trailways.

The new depot will occupy all of the building now housing the depot and the Green Spot market, whose lease expired July 1. Ralph Borrego, Oregon City, owner of the building, said immediate plans call for a complete change of the floor plan, including installation of a new cafeteria. The second floor, to be occupied by Trailways offices, will be constructed later, Borrego stated.

E. J. Callahan, Salem architect, is in charge of the plans, and blueprints for the job are nearly completed. The restaurant will be operated by Floyd R. McNeil, Salem restaurateur, and former owner of the Grand Central market. The restaurant will be located on the High street side in space now occupied by the market.

Other modernization plans call for enlargement of the ticket office and waiting room, construction of a baggage room and rest rooms and installation of a 10-foot marquee to facilitate under-car loading and unloading.

H. G. Cooper, manager of Trailways operations in Salem since 1945, will continue in charge. Simpson said.

Veterans Loans Reach New High

Farm and home loans approved by the state veterans department, aggregating \$832,000, reached a new monthly high in June this year, department officials announced Friday.

Loans since the inception of the department in June, 1945, aggregate more than \$6,000,000. The maximum farm and home loan is \$4,000, based on 75 per cent appraisal of the property to be purchased.

Officials predicted that the loan applications for July would show a slight decrease when compared with those for June.

Scouts Off for Summer Camp

About 75 Scouts from five Salem troops leave today for Camp Pioneer near Marion Forks for the first of the Cascade area's five week-long sessions of the summer season.

Leaving will be troop 23 and Scoutmaster C. B. Angus; troop 82 and Scoutmaster Dorsey Gray; troop 61 and Scoutmaster Charles Davis; troop 49 and Scoutmaster Laurence Kanoff; and troop 11 and Scoutmaster Leland Edwards.

Jerry Scott, executive of the Cascade council area, said much larger groups are expected to attend the camp in four periods later in the season. He pointed out that many scouts are working on the berry harvest and unable to attend the first session.

The camp staff was busy through all of last week preparing facilities to handle the first group. The camp is located about 60 miles southeast of Salem on Pine Ridge lake.

Fairview Project Nears Completion

A \$609,843 construction project at Fairview home is almost completed, Superintendent Dr. Irvin Hill said Friday.

A new laundry building, capable of handling laundry for 1,900 patients, is in operation. Two employees' cottages and a dormitory will be ready for occupancy within two weeks, Dr. Hill said.

The laundry provides employment and training for about 60 boys and girls of various state institutions. In addition to Fairview home laundry the plant will soon take care of laundry from state tuberculosis hospital and the state school for the blind.

Survivors are the father; three brothers, William Stephen and Fred Stephen, both of Salem and Berdette Stephen, Des Moines, Iowa; eight sisters Alice S. Sittala, June Panther, Elva Stephen, Alfretta Stephen, Viola Siefert, Ernest Stephen, Henrietta Stephen and Bernice Stephen, all of Salem; an uncle, Fred Wymore of Salem, and several uncles and aunts in the east.

John McCune, Gas Company Foreman, Dies

John Wilber McCune, 78, Salem route 9, for 28 years yard foreman at Portland Gas and Coke company here, died Friday at his residence. Funeral services are to be held Tuesday at 10 a.m. at the Clough-Barrick chapel, the Rev. Louis A. White officiating. Interment will be in Belcrest Memorial park.

McCune was born Nov. 28, 1869 in Tyrone, Pa. He later moved to Brookville, Kan., and became engaged in farming. While in Brookville he was married to Margaret Elkberry. Together they came to Salem in 1908 when he was employed by Portland Railway Light and Power company, predecessor to the gas and coke company. In 1936 he moved to his small farm on route 9.

He was a member of the Knight Memorial church and the Odd Fellows lodge.

Survivors are the widow, Margaret; daughters, Jessie E. Brooks, Mrs. Very E. Neubauer, Mrs. Elva T. Drakeley; sons, Wilber H. and Walter E. McCune, all of Salem, and by three granddaughters and one grandson.

Travel in State Still Increasing

Oregon drivers previewed traffic volumes to come by rolling up more mileage in May than in any month since last September, Secretary of State Earl Newbery reported Friday.

Travel for the month, estimated at 465,000,000 miles, was based on gasoline consumption and does not include the mileage of diesel operated vehicles.

Total May gasoline sales reached 38,877,346 gallons, nearly 7 per cent more than was consumed in April and 50 per cent more than was burned in prewar May of 1941. Taxes on this gallonage amounted to \$1,942,367.32.
