Robberies Net \$1087 in Salem On Week End

City police and the Marion county sheriff's office Monday night were seeking thieves who took at least \$1087 in cash, merchandise and jewelry in robberies over the week end.

Largest single loss investigated by city police was suffered by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McDonald, 3215 Silverton rd., who came home Sunday night to find \$755 in cash taken from a bedroom bureau drawer. Other items missing police reports said, were a man's pocket watch, chain and pearl-handled pocket knife, a string of pearls and an expensive watch band. Entry was gained through a bathroom window.

Entry was gained to the Hollywood Market, 2000 N. Capitol st., around 2 a. m. Sunday, city police said, through a small alley window. Records showed that \$310 in cash was taken from the safe which was forced with a meat cleaver, and from a metal change box.

Club Combo, 3087 Portland rd., was entered between closing time early Sunday and 3:55 p. m. Sunday afternoon through the back door, city police said. Twelve dollars in change was taken and possibly liquor, beer and cigarettes.

Sokols Hold One of Holidays' Outstanding Programs at Scio; Native Czech Costumes Used

SCIO, July 5 — Probably one of the most colorful Fourth of July celebrations in the Willamette valley was the Pacific Coast convention and calisthenics exhibitions of the Sokols, a physical culture order native to Czechoslovakia.

More than 500 visitors watched the picturesque dances and drills as well as the horizontal and parallel bar work of the young men and women of Czech ancestry, held on Scio's athletic field Sunday afternoon. One of the major attractions was the Czech Beda, a square dance native to Czechoslovakia, taken part in by 64 people all in native costume.

Prominent at the convention were Anthony Kohoutek, San Francisco, president of the Zupa Pacific Coast; Frank Vizek, San Francisco, and Otilie Prince, Los Angeles, district physical directors, and Henry Jozefek, San Francisco, all around champion for the past two years with the Olympics Athletic club, who gave a number of bar exhibitions. There were also 22 Sokols from San Francisco and a number from Los Angeles, Fresno, Seattle, Portland and Mill City who participated in dances, drill and bar work.

Mayor Carl Warren, Scio, welcomed the visitors, and John Tannich, Siroeta (chairman) of the local Sokol lodge, was master of ceremonies. Special rituals, in keeping with the weekend attended the flag raising of both the United States and Czechoslovakia, and the singing of the two national anthems.

Development and preservation of strong bodies are a major purpose of the Sokol organization, Mr. Kohoutek stated in his address. The order is now in its 26th year and men and women, both young and older, hold year-round practices in calisthenics and folk dances.

Scio's population includes many Czechs, the majority of whom came here after the first world war. In more recent years, a like settlement has come to live in Mill City and most of that group came to Scio Sunday to assist in the observance there.

The convention will be held in Los Angeles next year.

Salem Heights Water Trouble Gets Remedy

Manager E. B. Cotman of the Salem Heights water district reported much better service to the district's 300 customers Sunday and Monday, following the installation of a high pressure pump which went into operation Saturday.

Cotman said that "there are many kinks in the system to straighten out yet" but these are expected to be remedied this week with the arrival of pressure valves which will be installed at each service connection.

Several householders reported high pressure over the week end after Cotman worked late Saturday night to adjust the pressure in the system.

However, he said, after several adjustments Sunday, only one shut down was necessary Monday. The trouble Sunday and Monday, he said, was caused by thermal shut-off valves. The pump is powered by an emergency line and he anticipated lower voltage today due to the fact that Salem Industries would be back in service.

Irrigating, too, is causing some trouble on the system, he said, though he expected the rain to lessen the need for irrigation for several days while further adjustments are made.

Another bottleneck in the system, Cotman believed, is the use of two 2-inch mainlines and one 3-inch. These, he said, should eventually be replaced completely by 6-inch line of which there is only 2,400 feet at present in the system. About 3,000 feet of 6-inch line is needed to complete the system, he said.

GEOLOGIST RESCUED

C., and a plane trip to take a bearing from the air, led Sunday to the rescue of Geologist Robert Parry of Oklahoma, stranded almost two weeks on a rocky ledge overlooking the Dunedin river in the Canadian northland.

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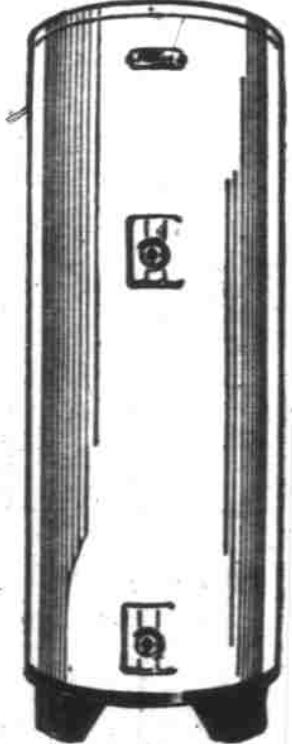
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
