Red Cross Official From Chile Meets With Local Board

María Louisa Torres, vice chairman of the International Red Cross, Santiago, Chile, was in Salem a few hours Tuesday to meet with the board of Marion county chapter, American Red Cross.

She has been in the United States since April, visiting Red Cross areas. She will leave for her home in early August. Purpose of her tour is to study the blood program and the disaster relief program.

She goes next to Rochester, N. Y., to spend two weeks at the blood bank center set up there by the American Red Cross to provide blood and all its derivatives, free of charge, to all in need of them.

Miss Torres' father, Manuel Torres, an army surgeon, organized the first Red Cross in Chile in 1914. While in Salem, Miss Torres was guest of Mrs. Kathryn Loiza.

It is estimated that more than half a million people die in the U. S. every year from causes brought on by high blood pressure.

Woolridge of Toledo, Ore.; and five brothers, Virgil Brittelli of Salem, Lester Floyd Brittelli of Auburn, Wash., Merlyn Brittelli of Bremerton, Wash., Stanley Brittelli of Santa Barbara, Calif., and Allen G. Brittelli of Seattle.

Also surviving are brothers and sisters-in-laws, Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Burgess and Mr. and Mrs. William U. Burgess of Casper, Wyo.

Keizer Area Petition Seeks Dike District

A petition seeking establishment of a dike district in the Keizer area was filed with the Marion county court Tuesday. County Assessor R. S. Shelton is checking the 178 property owners' names on the petition.

Signers of the petition state they own about 800 acres in the proposed district. Purpose of the district would be to prevent flooding from the Willamette river overflow by erecting dikes at strategic low-land points.

A. L. Mason, chairman of the citizens committee filing the petition, said that petitioners constituted ownership of more than 50 per cent of the total property involved in the proposed district. If this is verified by the assessor's report, the county court said, a hearing will be scheduled to determine the necessity of the district.

57 Years Ago

July 3, 1891

Big news 57 years ago was when "nearly a thousand people assembled at the new Fair Ground Baseball park to watch the Salem boys shut out Albany."

★ ★
"The River Excursion. — Shortly before noon yesterday the steamer Hoag's sonorous whistle sounded and set the wild echoes flying, reverberating from hill to hill on the Polk county side. This was to announce the arrival in Port at Salem of the baseball excursion from Corvallis, Albany, and Independence. The boat was comfortably filled, carrying about 200 excursionists from the points named. These visitors spent a few hours in taking in the sights of the city and visiting the state institutions, previous to the call of time in the long-looked-for baseball game. Generally the strangers report themselves as pleased with the city, her improvements underway or completed, her progress, prosperity, and enterprise. They seemed to enjoy themselves, and Salem most certainly highly appreciated their visit. Promptly at 5 o'clock the steamer pulled out for Albany, leaving about seventy-five of her party behind. They had waited at the ball grounds to see the last inning to a finish. The belated excursionist had no recourse but to return home by rail."
