Vanport Extension to Continue; UO, OSC Contracts Studied

PORTLAND, July 7.—Provision for continuation of the Vanport extension center for another year and decisions on a group of building projects at the state college and university were made today by the state board of higher education.

Arrangements have been agreed to by governmental agencies for release of the administration building at the Oregon shipyard near St. Johns to the board from now until June 30, 1949, for the college center.

The center, which gave two years of college work mostly to veterans, was destroyed in the Memorial day flood disaster. About 1,400 students were finishing the spring term. The center has been conducting a summer school at Portland's Grant high school, attended by about 450.

Ideally Suited

Dr. C. D. Byrne, secretary of the board, and Dean J. F. Cramer, head of the general extension division, told board members the administration building is ideally suited for classroom purposes. Most of remaining temporary houses in the Portland area, as well as ample trailer house sites, are nearby, they said.

The board voted to continue the name Vanport extension center to simplify legal procedures and to provide a "monument" to the memory of Vanport which is not expected to be rebuilt.

A contract with Nuveen & Company, Chicago bond firm, to assist in arranging details and prospectus for a proposed University of Oregon bond issue was entered into by the board.

Bond Issue Planned

Under the plan a bond issue of \$1,800,000 will be advertised for bids this fall, backed by the student building fee, student union fee and athletic income. \$250,000 of the proceeds will be used to add a second balcony to McArthur court and a south horseshoe concrete stand to Hayward field. The remainder would supplement gifts in financing the proposed union building.

The athletic plant expansion is designed to add 3,000 to the seating capacity of McArthur court and from 5,000 to 7,000 to the capacity of the football stadium. Contract Awarded

The board approved preliminary plans for these expansions at Eugene and authorized architects to prepare final plans and specifications.

Earlier in the day the board awarded a contract to Warren Construction company of Portland for paving streets and laying sidewalks on the Oregon state campus at Corvallis. The bid was \$51,577—well below estimates. The contract award is subject to final approval by the state board of control and state emergency board.

All three bids submitted on a proposed home management house for the school of economics at OSC were rejected when the lowest was \$80,000 for construction alone. The board had \$56,000 allocated for this project.

Jobless Pay Rises in Area Over '47 Total

Unemployment benefit payments for last month were higher in Marion, Polk and Benton counties than in June of last year, the state unemployment compensation reported Wednesday.

In this area only Linn county's \$3,251 paid out in June was below the \$5,716 there a year ago.

Marion county's jobless received \$23,525 last month as compared with \$22,118 in June of last year. Readjustment allowances to idle veterans also had increased last month to \$15,211 from \$12,352 of last year.

In Polk county \$3,493 was paid out last month or about \$1,400 more than in June of 1947. Polk county veterans received \$3,040 compared to \$2,315. In Benton county civilian payments last month came to \$1,925 compared with \$1,890 and veterans received \$2,688 compared with \$2,224 a year ago.

Decline in June
Total benefit payments, however, for all three counties were down almost half in June from May's figures, the commission reported. Increased payments over last year can be accounted for in part, a commission spokesman said, by the boosted benefit schedule granted by the 1947 legislature. The number of benefits paid last month over the entire state was only 1 per cent over June, 1947, the commission reported. June floods, however, caused an above-normal claims load in northwestern Oregon.

Decline in State
June payments for the state totaled only \$454,873, a decrease of nearly 14 per cent from May. Readjustment allowances to unemployed veterans dropped 13 per cent from the previous month to \$348,563 last month.

Despite slightly higher average weekly checks than last year, payments handled by the commission decreased from \$9,306,727 for the first half of 1947 to \$8,800,824 for the six months just past. More than half went to those recently discharged from the armed services. With a benefit year starting July 5 for those covered by state law, only 8,717 claims were on hand compared with 9,872 for this time last year.

Summer Heat Lowers Cream Grade Scores

The necessity for carefully handling and prompt delivery of cream during the warmer season of the year is reflected in findings of the judges who last week conducted an official scoring of butter samples from southern and eastern Oregon, state agricultural department officials announced Wednesday.

Kenneth E. Carl, assistant chief of the foods and dairies division, has completed the scoring. He found that of 39 pounds of butter labeled Grade A, only nine actually scored this quality while 38 samples were dropped to Grade B. In a comparable scoring on April 15, of 40 samples of butter labeled Grade A at the creamery, 23 scored A grade and 17 B grade.

In the June scoring seven of the official samples were labeled Grade B by the original butter-maker. Four of these set the labeled score and three were dropped to C grade butter.

Eight of the samples scored last month were low in butterfat content. The state law requires a minimum of 80 per cent fat. Scoring was done by a board composed of representatives of the industry, the dairy manufacturing department at Oregon State college and the state agricultural department.
