

Children's Parade Featured In Cherry Festival Schedule

There may be events with bigger things in them during Salem's forthcoming Cherryland festival, but the children's parade next Saturday morning will be among the best and most interesting, so indicate the co-chairmen, Charles Claggett and Hunt Clark.

Cherryland festival events, including a nightly show at the state fairgrounds, will continue through next Sunday night, after formal festival opening at the Salem armory at 12:30 p.m. Thursday.

The young paraders will meet at Marion square at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, July 17, for assembling and judging of costumes and decorated vehicles. Any child eight years old or younger, from all Willamette valley communities, may enter with any type of wheeled conveyance such as bicycles, buggies, tricycles, wagons or scooters. An entrant may be accompanied by an older person.

To enter, an entry blank must be filled out and submitted not later than Thursday, July 15, at the Salem Chamber of Commerce or at any of the Cherryland festival ticket booths on downtown streets in Salem.

Music for the Saturday parade will be provided by the Coos Bay junior band and the Salem Eagles junior band. The float parade with these and other bands performing is to be a Friday morning event.

Grain Market Prices Steady

CHICAGO, July 10 (AP)—The grain market took a government forecast for an unprecedented wheat, corn and oats crop without too much excitement today. Corn had some shaky moments and mostly finished lower, but oats were down only slightly and wheat ended with a steady undertone.

With a record breaking corn crop predicted, the near-by deliveries of this grain met the biggest selling. July corn sank to the lowest level since early March while September corn sank to a new low since the mid-February price break. Losses were reduced before the close.

Wheat closed 1/4 lower to 3/8 higher, July \$2.29 1/2; corn was 3/8 lower to 1/2 higher, July \$1.99-1.99 1/4; oats were unchanged to 1/8 lower, July 88 1/2-1/2, and soybeans were 3 to 3 1/2 lower, July \$4.00. All grain contracts were under last year's prices at this time.

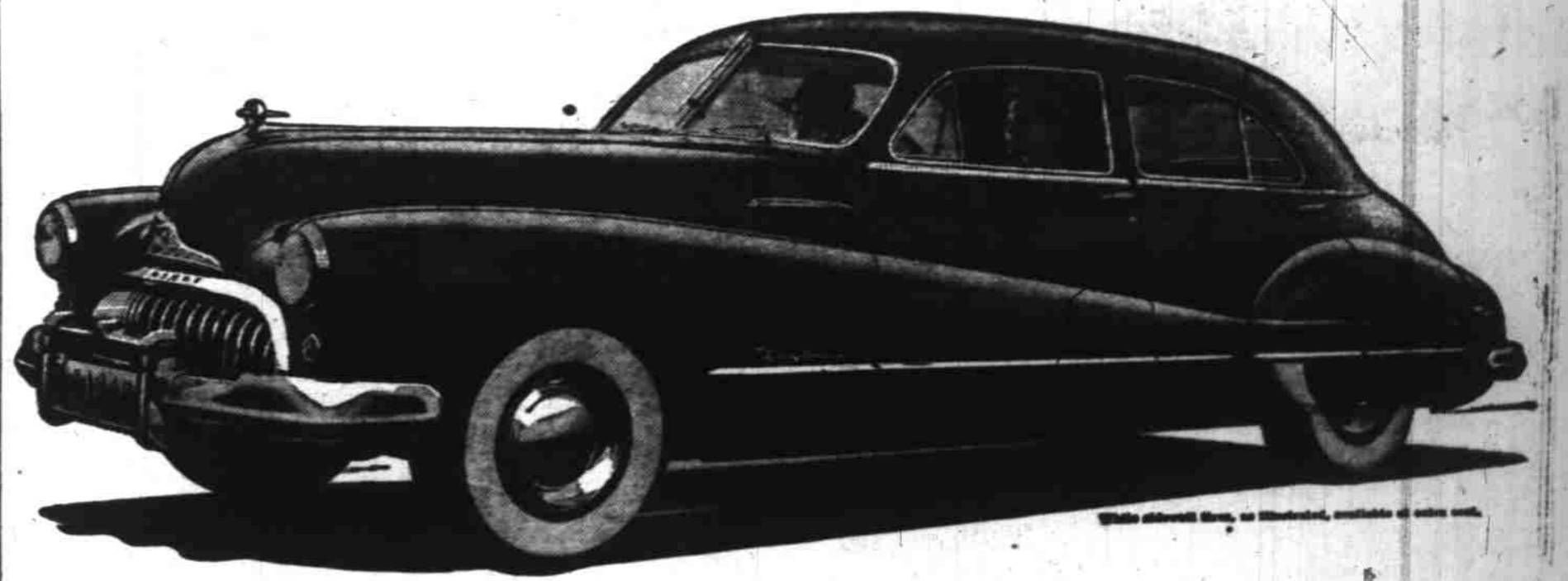
Stoltz Hill Woman Has Bout with Chicken Thief
