Over 400 Gunners to Fire In 15th Annual Tournament

The 15th Annual Grand Pacific Trapshooting tournament, sec-ond only to the Grand National each year in Vandalia, O., opens its four-day stand on the Salem Trapshooters club range next Thursday at 10 a.m. Upwards of 400 dead-eyed scattergunners, some of them from as far away as Boston, Mass., are registered to vie for the \$7000 added cash prizes and numerous other valuable awards corraled by the local sponsoring club. No less than 122 business firms in Salem have contributed to the terrific prize list.

The dozens of shooters, some of them nationally famous, will go for championships in singles, doubles and handicaps in all four classes, A, B, C and D. Women and juniors (under 17 years old) will also have their shootoffs. The classic will end next Sunday with the Grand Pacific Handicap event.

Governor John Hall will open the tournament Thursday morning by firing the first shot. The field will then commence competition in the 16-yard singles and championship doubles events.


