Summertime Suggestions Offered to Housewife; Talk About Jam, Meat

Summertime suggestions. Avocados are coming in giant-sized packages these days, and the purchaser should remember that these big black peels have a hard shell which never softens upon becoming ripe. Some women let them get over-ripe while waiting for the firmness to leave.

Avocados are good quartered and with skin left on, when filled with fruit salad or a good flavorful shrimp or crab salad. Sprinkle a bit of lemon juice over the top before filling the halves.

Tag ends of preserves or jelly make good ice cream topping.

Most folk like something hot in a meal, even on warmest of days. If you plan a cold menu, serve a hot beverage, or if the beverage is to be cold, plan a hot vegetable or meat.

Some women are serving a "mock chicken salad" by using their regular recipe only putting in a can of diced pork for juniors.

Experts tell us that the pressure saucepan and the pressure canner are not to be used interchangeably. It takes too long for the large pressure cooker to get required heat to cook vegetables and too long a time to cook, though it can be utilized for some long-cooking foods such as meat, beans and cereals. The pressure saucepan on the other hand is to be used for fresh foods but is not suited to canning because the exact amount of pressure is not indicated. A pressure canner cannot be safely cooled with running water as is the saucepan.

Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Johnson have returned from a week's sojourn along the coast, stopping at Gearhart and Neahkahnie.

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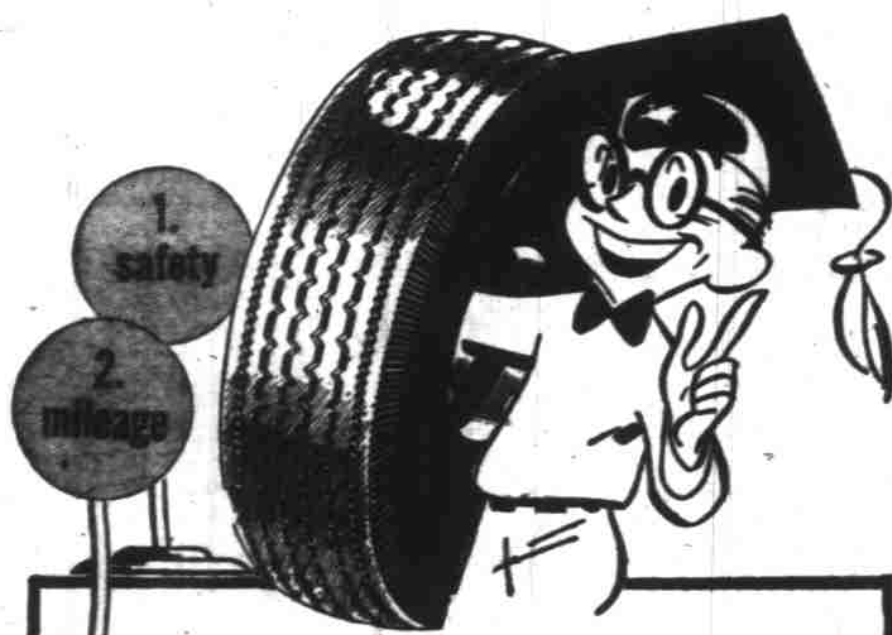

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Amateur Photo Fans Urged To Enter Statesman Contest

The week end provided a time for all local amateur photographers to grab a roll of film, dust off the camera's lens and snap away on pictures to enter in the Statesman's summer photo contest. Entries for the first week of this big contest with more than \$125 in prizes must be in by midnight tomorrow or the photos will be entered in next week's contests. Anybody may enter. No entry fees, no obligations. Just as long as the snapshooter is an amateur who takes pictures as a hobby or for his family.

Expensive cameras and equipment aren't needed for the Statesman's photo contest. Among the first entries are two pictures taken with a 20-year-old Kodak, and they look like they will be "right up there" in the judging.

One point needing stressing is that all photo entries must be no smaller than 5x7 inches in size. This will mean enlarging, but any photo dealer will be glad to cooperate with contestants. Enlargement will help the judges to make their decisions. Pictures must not be larger than 11x14 inches, however.

Contest rules are:

1. Pictures must have been taken since June 1, 1944.
2. Pictures must be on glossy paper, preferably no smaller than 5x7 and no larger than 11x14.
3. On the back of each entry must be pasted a sheet giving your name and address; the classification you are entering; data on the photo, including camera used, film, shutter speed, diaphragm opening, filter, etc., and whatever other information is pertinent including identification of subject matter and conditions under which picture was taken.
4. Entries become the property of The Oregon Statesman and winners will be published in this newspaper.
5. Grand prize winners will be entered in the annual Associated Press Northwest Photo Contest, and any awards accruing therefrom will go to the persons entering the pictures.
6. No entries acceptable if they have been or are being entered in other contests.
7. Decision of impartial judges will be final.
8. Entries should be mailed or brought to the Photo Department, The Oregon Statesman, 215 S. Commercial st., Salem, Ore.

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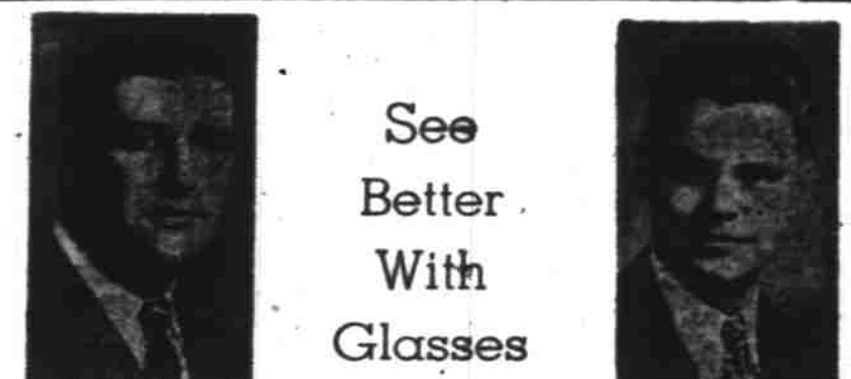
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
