

Democratic Platform Follows Administration Set Policies

PHILADELPHIA, July 13 (AP)—The platform announced tonight by the platform committee of the Democratic party in convention here failed to include a declaration of states' rights. The platform included: **Civil Rights**—The party commits itself to "continuing its efforts to eradicate all racial, religious and economic discrimination." The platform committee rejected amendments proposing to spell out approval of President Truman's civil rights program. It also rejected states' rights amendments offered by southerners.

Judge Admits Embezzlement Of \$630,000

NEWARK, N. J., July 13 (AP)—A Newark police court judge today admitted to embezzling more than half million dollars from a bank and losing it in horse race bets.

The judge, dapper, 38-year-old P. James Pellicchia, Jr., who last year was named the nation's best dressed jurist, pleaded guilty before common pleas Judge Philip Hartshorne to 20 charges of embezzlement.

Pellicchia, who is vice president and counsel of the bank, the Columbus Trust Co., was imprisoned pending a bail hearing Friday.

He faces a possible maximum seven year sentence on each of the 20 counts or a total of 140 years in prison.

State Banking Commissioner John J. Dickerson announced Pellicchia's arrest with the disclosure that an examination of the bank's affairs had uncovered a shortage of \$630,000 caused by the loaning of money on "fictitious mortgages."

Pellicchia, was quoted by Dickerson as having said he "lost all of the money gambling on horses, betting most of it with bookies."

PUC Ordered To Set Hauling Permit Hearing

Marion County Circuit Judge E. M. Page on Tuesday ordered John H. Carlin, state public utilities commissioner, to set hearing dates on a petition for a hauling permit.

The order came in the form of an alternative writ of mandamus requested by C. C. Horger, operator of the Oregon Freight lines. In his request Horger stated that on last December 31 he had made application for a PUC permit to operate on Oregon highways as a fixed terminal carrier.

Horger alleged that Commissioner Carlin has refused to grant him a hearing while processing other applications filed long after Horger's. The order allows Carlin until July 27 to set the hearing or to show cause why he has not done so.

2 Accidents, Near-Drowning, Fire Keep City Hall Emergency Phones Busy for Quarter Hour

Things happened fast in city hall radio room between four and five o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Between 4:15 and 4:37 police radio handled two first aid calls, including a suspected drowning, an accident and a fire call.

It all began at 4:15 when Salem first aidmen were called to 1155 Nebraska st., where Mrs. John McCully accidentally fell from a ladder while she was picking cherries. She was treated by aid men for an injured leg.

At 4:18 p.m. police were called to the scene of an accident in the 2300 block of State street where a pedestrian, Carl Ritterling, 2155 Mill st., was treated by aid men for lacerations on the head, elbow and knee. Police reported that Ritterling was struck by a car driven by John H. Brown, 2217 State st., but Brown was not held.

Fire Called In Nearly coincidentally the radio room received calls on a reported drowning and a fire at 4:35 and 4:37 p.m., respectively. The fire was extinguished by Salem firemen at the West Salem Lumber company on Wallace road, West Salem, where a spark was believed to have ignited a pile of logs. To add to the confusion at the time, a Salem fire engine was delayed for eight minutes on the Polk county bridge due to the volume of traffic at the time, West Salem Mayor Walter Musgrave reported. Little damage was reported by the fire, firemen said, but flames were hot and firemen were able to use their new water wetter to best advantage.

Reported Drowning Bobby Bunch, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Bunch, Hayesville, was the victim of the reported drowning. He accidentally fell in the mill race at 180 S. 19th st., where he was staying with Mrs. Fred Humphreys for the day. The Humphreys boys, Gordon, 8, and Curtis, 14, saw the boy go down the stream and ran to the first aid station nearby to obtain help. Before help arrived the boy had floated down the stream to about 15th street where an unidentified woman pulled him out unconscious. He was given artificial respiration by firemen including Dale Siefert and Capt. Paul Phillips, oxygen by first aid men on their arrival and taken to Salem General hospital and released. Mrs. Humphreys reported he was resting well at her home Tuesday night and expected to go home today.

City Manager Addresses 20-30 Club

City Manager J. L. Franzen addressed members of Salem 20-30 club meeting at Gold Arrow restaurant Tuesday night.

Text of Franzen's address was the history of municipal governments beginning with those of England. Franzen also answered questions concerning Salem type of government which he said is in operation in cities totaling 17,000, 000 people in the United States and 200,000 people in the state of Oregon.

In answering questions on present and future plans of the city government here he stressed the need for better water facilities which he said are presently over-taxed. Franzen said that as soon as Detroit dam is completed on the North Santiam Salem will take water and run new pipelines from the Detroit lake formed there. This would give the city the most modern and adequate water facilities in the country, he said.
