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Complete Line In Engraving Field Available

Establishment of one of the few commercial art departments in the northwest was announced by Salem Engraving, division of The Statesman Publishing Co.

The department, which enables a more complete engraving service — from the original idea to the finished engraving, is equipped for advertising spreads, air-brush photo re-touching and preparation of pictorial spreads.

In charge of the department is Bob Browne, a midwesterner who was a frequent visitor before World War II and now has returned to make Salem his home. His education and practical experience has covered everything from a grounding in basic art techniques to special knowledge of art for reproduction.

Browne declared Monday his department was equipped to meet every art need, from letter-heads to layouts, from cartoons to catalogs, from match books to menu covers. The department is in The Oregon Statesman building.

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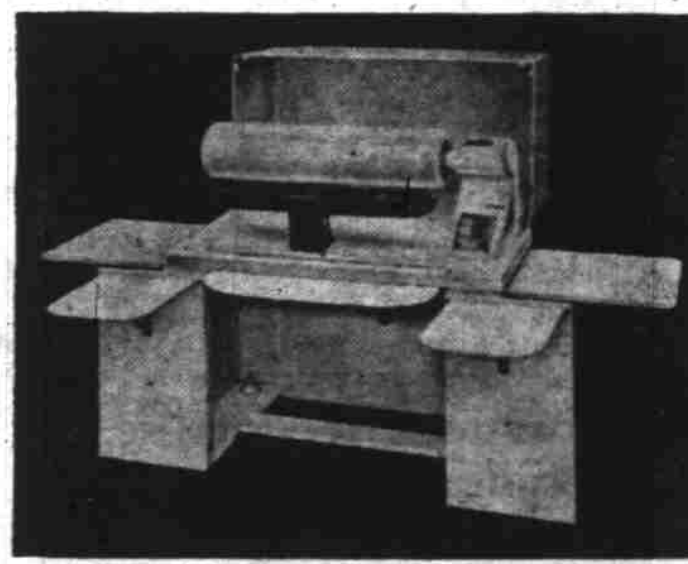
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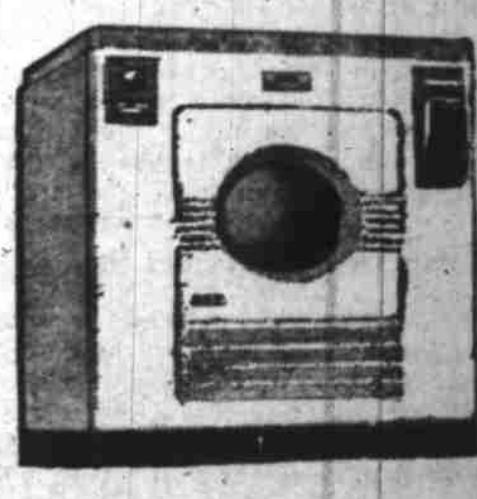
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
