Some salad shorts:

A little bit of the bitter helps the sweet, they say. And the system works especially well in salads. A few leaves of spinach, freshly sprouted dandelion leaves from the front lawn, or some chicory, will give the necessary bitter flavor to a green summer salad. It's surprising, and surprisingly good. Wild sour grass or nasturtium leaves also add good flavor.

Not new, but sometimes forgotten, is the advantage of a little crumbled up Roquefort cheese in the French dressing for a mixed vegetable salad.

Terragon vinegar (which we note has returned to the grocer's shelves) is another special treat to the salad eater. A variety of vinegars adds interest and fun to making salad. Some of the terragon vinegar actually contains the leaf of the herb, so you know you're getting the flavor for the money.

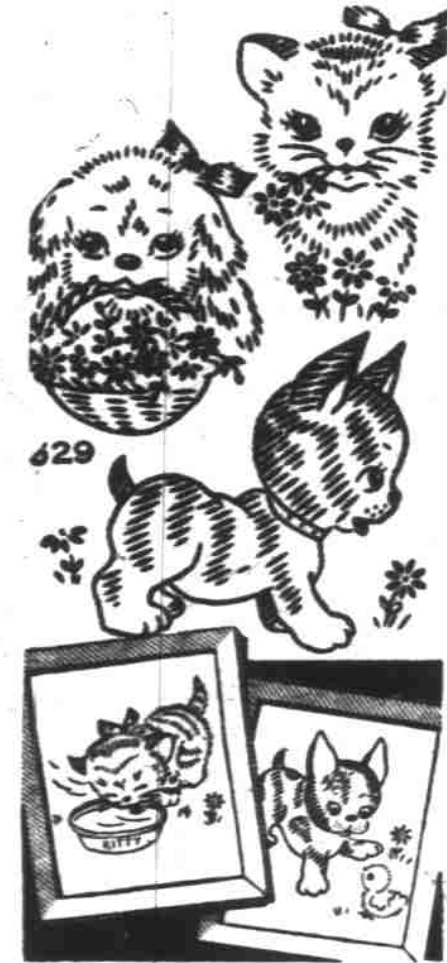
