Mrs. J. N. Bishop has invited members of the Gaiety Hill Garden club to luncheon at her Leslie street home Monday afternoon.

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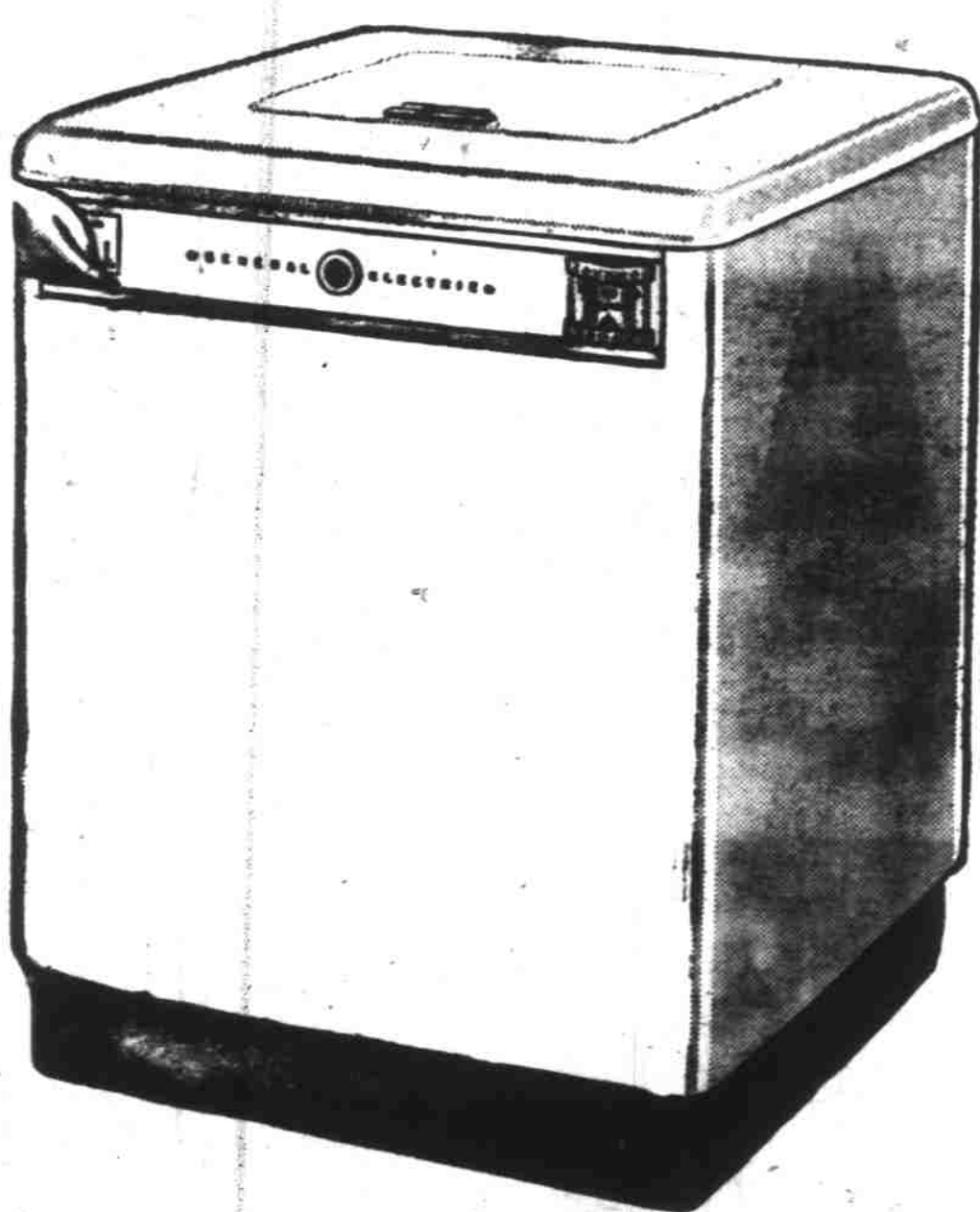
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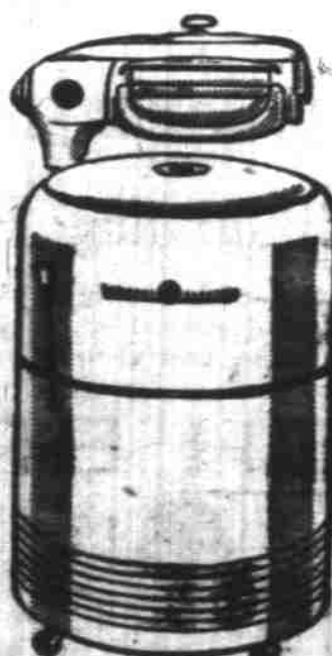
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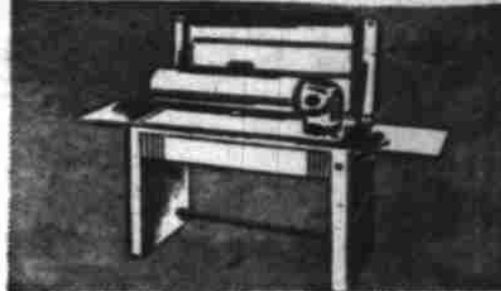
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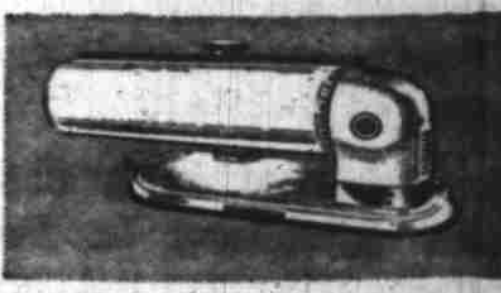
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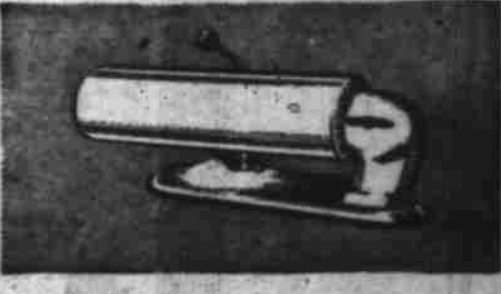
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
