Woman Jailed Here To Face Charges Of Bogus Checks

Bad check charges faced Leta Eileen Lewis on Monday night after her arrest in Salem by state police and Marion county sheriff's office. She was held in the county jail.

Sheriff Denver Young said the Salem woman admitted cashing bogus checks in 21 Willamette valley towns in recent weeks. The sheriff estimated the checks would amount to \$2,000.

Charges placed against the woman were both obtaining money under false pretenses and writing check with insufficient funds to cover Young said both a Stayton justice court warrant and a state police-held warrant resulted in the woman's arrest here. He said some of the names used by Miss Lewis included Evelyn Boise, Shirley Mahan, Bonnie Lee Moore and Joan Mendenhall.
