

## Service Registration Described as Painless, Simple and Swift Task

 WASHINGTON, July 20 (AP)—Registering for the draft isn't going to be so bad, boys. It will be simple, painless and fairly swift. Selective service headquarters says details haven't been fully worked out, but the routine will go something like this:

1. Men will register by age groups. Pick your date out of the following and wait:
  - Persons born in 1922 after Aug. 30 will register on Aug. 30; persons born in 1923 will register Aug. 31-Sept. 1; 1924-Sept. 2-3; 1925-Sept. 4 or Sept. 7; 1926-Sept. 8-9; 1927-Sept. 10-11; 1928-Sept. 13-14; 1929-Sept. 15-16; persons born in 1930 before Sept. 19-Sept. 17-18.
  - Boys born on or after Sept. 19, 1930, will register on their birthday, or within five days after.
2. On registration date, you report to the local draft office. You need not carry along birth certificates and such, although they may be asked for later.
3. You fill out a simple form, possibly answering five or six questions. Attach fingerprints, and sign. It should take only a few minutes, although this depends on the efficiency of your local draft board.
4. Go home and wait. A week or ten days after you have registered, you will receive a questionnaire from your local board.
5. This questionnaire gets personal, asking you all sorts of questions, such as your marital status, how much money you make and how, etc. It'll take a bit more time filling this one out. You do so and then send it back to your local board.
6. Your classification is determined by this bit of paper, which stays in your local board's file.
7. Then the army decides it needs 31,741 men during the month of, say, November. Your draft board is notified that its quota is 11 men. The local men thumb through their files. They come on your questionnaire. Maybe they decide you're one of the eleven. They tell Washington.
8. You get a greeting from the president.
9. You get your affairs in order, report, take a physical and if you pass—
10. Hi, soldier!

## Steel Company Jumps Prices

NEW YORK, July 20 (AP)—United States Steel corp., America's largest producer, today announced an average price increase of \$9.34 a ton on finished steel products of its subsidiaries.

The increase, effective tomorrow, restores an average reduction of \$1.25 a ton made last April and in addition adds another increase of \$8.09 a ton in base prices for major steel products.

The corporation said the increase of \$8.09 represented a percentage increase of about 9.6 per cent. The corporation granted 170,000 production workers an increase in wages of about 9 per cent last Friday and cited other rising costs as back of the boost.

The work involves a half acre of clearing, excavation of 4260 cubic yards, 690 yards of embankment from gravel borrow, and 2610 yards of dumped stone revetment.

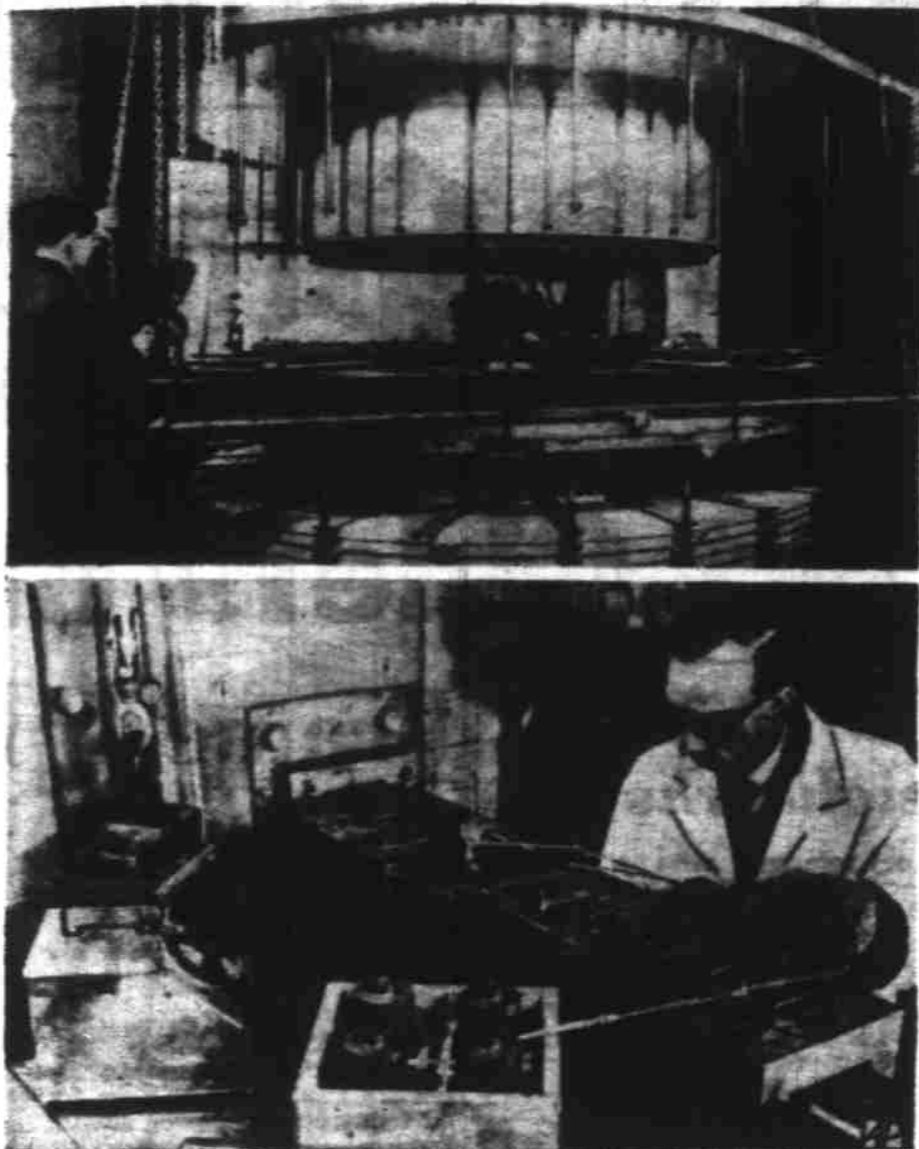
An autopsy is to be performed this morning by Clough-Barrick company, where funeral arrangements will be announced later, it was reported. No survivors had been contacted by early this morning.

## State Offices Site Urged for East Portland

 The state board of control, meeting here Tuesday, heard members of the Portland East-Side Commercial club who advocated Holladay park, a Portland eastside area of 32 blocks, as a preferred site for the proposed new \$2,000,000 state office building for that city.

The other site proposed for the building is in the Plaza blocks on Portland's west side.

M. D. Wells, chairman of the East Side group, noted that the cost of construction in the midst of heavy traffic on the west side would be much greater than in a district where contractors will not be impeded in their work by conforming to traffic rules.

Other points stressed by the group in favoring the Holladay park area were its central location, economy in property cost and nearness to other state and government offices.

Roy Mills, board of control secretary, reported that he had investigated approximately 15 proposed sites for the office building and would file a formal report within a short time.

Gov. John H. Hall said he preferred early construction of the building for the reason that state offices are now scattered all over the city of Portland with rentals mounting each year.

## 3 Firms Underbid Estimates for Job At McNary Dam

PORTLAND, July 20 (AP)—Three firms joined today in bidding \$21,648,763 — nearly \$2,000,000 under the government estimate — on a major job in building McNary dam.

The offer was by Guy F. Atkinson Co., San Francisco, J. A. Jones, Charlotte, S. C. and Osterlander Construction Co., Portland, on the Columbia-spanning dam now under construction at Umatilla, Ore.

The job involves construction of a major portion of the navigation lock, abutment embankment, fishways, a portion of the spillway dam and other structures on a section at the Washington state end of the dam.

Col. O. E. Walsh, district engineer, said the government's estimate based on hired labor was \$23,642,619.

Bidding separately on providing 840,000 tons of coarse and 380,000 tons of fine concrete aggregate for the job, J. C. Sholwell, Albuquerque, N. M., was low at \$1,498,200.

Today's bids were referred to the North Pacific division engineer, Walsh, as contracts would be on a continuing basis, with about half of the 1949 fiscal appropriation of \$22,000,000 used on them.
