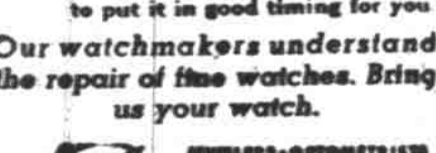

Digging doggedly into the soil of the site for the new Sears, Roebuck & Co. store, Gov. John H. Hall Tuesday morning turned the first shovel of dirt to mark start of the \$2,000,000 construction project.

Spectators gathered at Marion and North Capitol streets to witness the event along with representatives of construction contractors, builders and local personalities.

The formalities marking the beginning of construction on the second building to be started in the shopping center project. Work started on Berg's super-market a few weeks ago. Sears store will have a 200-foot front on North Capitol street. Three other buildings will be built for the center besides spacious parking lots.

Service Offices Open Rolls to 18-Year-Old Enlistments Today

Salem's army, marine and navy recruiting stations here will throw their doors open today to a limited number of one-year enlistments from 18-year-olds, it was announced Tuesday.

Sparted by recent enactment of the draft law applicable to men 19 through 25, the limited enlistments will continue until further orders, recruiters said.

Quota for army enlistments in the 18-year division from now until August 27 is 15 for the army and one for the air force, Lt. Col. Howard Heliessen, army recruiting commander here, announced.

Those taking the one-year enlistment must also obligate themselves to six years in an army reserve group, following discharge, in order to satisfy the draft act requirements, Col. Heliessen said.
