Summer Idea

Gelatin Comes in Handy for Summer Hostess as Base for Main Dishes

Gelatin salads and desserts have served the hostess or family cook in many an emergency and may do the same for her as summer time main dishes.

Gelatin's one of the few foods that serves as salad, main dish and dessert but it's about as good in one as another.

Let's look at gelatin as a possibility for main dishes, for family or company meals.

In the first place, the jellied dish is prepared ahead of time, usually in the morning when cool air will easily permit the cooking.

Fish aspic, using tomato juice as a base is attractive and well liked. It will serve as a nontime company fare, or for dinner for the family.

Use the juice as the liquid in your regular gelatin mixture, using either plain gelatin or lemon or lime flavored. Add a dash of lemon juice for part of the liquid, flavor the tomato with pickle relish and celery seed. Add one cup tuna, crab, shrimp or other cooked fish and allow it to congeal. Arrange on lettuce and garnish with olives and dill pickles.

The national meat board test kitchen sends a recipe for a fine sounding jellied Swedish meat ring, which of course features their products. It sounds a bit complicated, but really is not too much so, and should produce a mighty handsome mold.

One can make a striped meat loaf with little extra effort, by arranging alternate layers of meat, cream cheese and clear gelatin.

JELLIED SWEDISH MEAT RING

- 1 envelope plain gelatin
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 1 1/2 cups tomato juice
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon clove
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 3/4 cup finely chopped celery
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped stuffed olives
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 head lettuce, shredded

Cut liver sausage in salt cubes. Soften gelatin in cold water. Heat 1/2 cup tomato juice just below boiling. Dissolve gelatin in tomato juice. Combine with remaining tomato juice, sugar, lemon juice, clove, salt and pepper. Cool until mixture begins to thicken. Combine liver sausage and remaining ingredients with gelatin-tomato mixture. Turn into a 9-inch ring mold which has been rinsed with cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on a chilled platter over a large lettuce cup. Arrange slices of cold meats around meat ring. Garnish with assorted relishes. 8 to 10 servings.

ger home and Mr. and Mrs. Walter Evans of Dallas were dinner hosts for them Thursday.

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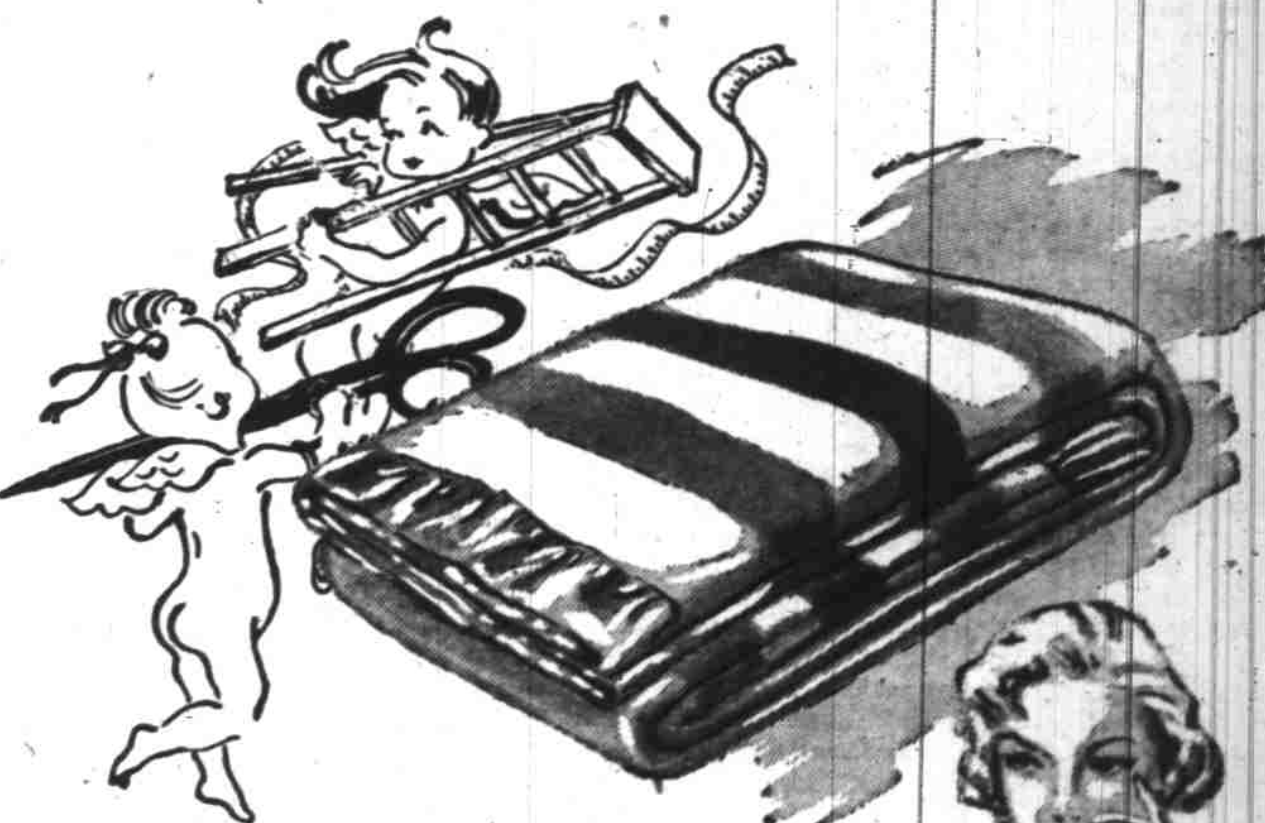


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
