

Cobra Strikes—A Woman Dies

Army Reveals Korea Outpost Attack Details

Russian hand grenades were used by north Koreans in the July 19 attack on U. S. soldiers near the American-Soviet occupation boundary, the army announced today.

One American soldier was killed, five were disarmed and a jeep was stolen. It was the first fatality in several incidents along the line dividing north and south Korea.

The army reported the latest incident Tuesday and, after thorough investigation, gave this detailed account:

North Koreans wearing civilian clothes attacked a U. S. outpost in bright moonlight about 400 yards south of the occupation border, near Kaesong. They overwhelmed five soldiers, took their rifles and jeep.

The attackers withdrew across the border, one of them throwing a hand grenade just as two relief guards pulled up in another jeep. The grenade hit the jeep.

The Koreans threw two more grenades, one of which failed to explode. The army announcement said the unexploded grenade was "fully identifiable as Soviet."

With one American dead and another wounded, the others withdrew under fire. The army said the north Koreans were using Japanese rifles.

The outpost consisted of a road-block and a sheet iron sentry box.

United Airliners Add Third Crew Member

CHICAGO, July 22—(AP)—A combination pilot-engineer will serve as a third crew member on United Airlines' Douglas DC-6 planes on future runs, R. F. Ahrens, personnel director of the airline, announced today.

This is in line with a civil aeronautics board order of April 14 which requires such crew members on larger airplanes by December 1, Ahrens said. United Airlines has 39 of the 50-passenger DC-6s.

Two Spinsters Convicted for Mistreatment

SANTA MONICA, Calif., July 22—(AP)—Two spinsters, Marie Clavey, 60, and Josephine Vella, 58, were convicted tonight by a superior court jury of cruelty to a minor, false imprisonment and contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

They were charged with imprisoning two young people in a filthy and flea-ridden beachfront cabin at Venice.

The jury deliberated four hours and 13 minutes before reaching a decision. Both elderly women were obviously stunned when they heard the verdict.

Miss Clavey was convicted on three felony counts and one misdemeanor. Her maximum sentence could be 26 years in prison. Miss Vella was convicted on one felony count and three misdemeanors and she could be sentenced for a maximum of six years.

The trial grew out of their treatment of John Joseph Wayne, 12, and Bessie Edna Dinmore, 27, who lived with them in a beachfront cabin.

Marie Confident Of Forming New French Cabinet

PARIS, Friday, July 23 —(AP)—Andre Marie said early today he has better than a 50 per cent chance of forming a new French government.

The ailing conservative said he was confident of becoming head of the government, but that it was doubtful he could form his cabinet before Sunday.

Marie told members of his radical-socialist party, that he would delay telling Auroir of his acceptance until late today.

This meant Auroir could not ask the national assembly for a vote of confidence before Saturday. Only then can he start building the cabinet.

Kansas, Ohio Areas Flooded

CHICAGO, July 22—(AP)—Heavy overnight rains brought flood conditions today to southeastern Kansas and an area in central Ohio.

Southeastern Kansas felt the impact of last night's downpour as swollen rivers inundated thousands of acres of rich bottomland.

The Neosho river was out of its banks between Burlington and Chanute. At Iola, Kan., scores of families were forced to abandon their homes.

At Lancaster, Ohio, a flash flood inundated the west side of the city, forcing scores of families to flee by boat.

Five Witnesses Refuse to Talk In 'Red' Trial

SEATTLE, July 22 —(AP)— Five more witnesses headed today toward contempt citations from the legislature's un-American activities investigating committee.

By refusing to answer questions, they raised to nine the number listed by the committee for "contempt of the legislature" actions in superior court.

Those who refused to answer "yes" or "no" to the question of whether they are or have been communist party members were:

Mr. and Mrs. Burton James, co-directors of the Seattle Repertory playhouse; Rachmiel Forschmidt, senior sanitarian in the Seattle health department, and Joseph Butterworth, University of Washington English department teacher for 19 years.

Assoc. Prof. Melville Jacobs of the university's anthropology department likewise was informed he would be charged with contempt for his refusal to say whether or not specific other faculty members had been at communist meetings with him. He acknowledged that he was a member for 10 years, prior to 1946.
