

Council Sets Zone Hearings, Defers Solicitor Ordinance

Salem's city council Monday night set two zone change hearings and initiated legislation to waive a setback restriction, in response to city planning and zoning commission endorsement of building plans for local church, lodge and pharmacy.

The council set August 9 hearings on proposed council action to permit First Christian church to build a new church at Marion and Cottage streets, in a class II residential zone, and to change to a business zone the Grear street property near Salem General hospital where P. D. Quisenberry plans to erect a pharmacy building. Three medical clinic buildings already have been approved for that vicinity.

A bill was introduced to waive normal setback restriction on Gaines street near North Summer street at the site of a Masonic lodge building for Salem Lodge of Perfection.

Councilmen again deferred action on the long-pending bills for regulation of door-to-door salesmen and solicitors. Under present restrictions, however, the council approved applications by J. B. Newhardt, Salem route 4, for World Book encyclopedia sales in Salem, and by Sylvia and Merritt Bruce of Salem to sell demoting cards.

The council reconsidered earlier action setting riverfront lease rentals and cut from \$30 to \$15 monthly the rent for moorage rights held by Staller, Tuor and Merwin small boat servicing station.

Capital post 9, American Legion, was granted a request that the city locate its recently acquired World War I trophy, a huge 155 mm. howitzer, on the grounds of the new post clubhouse at 2650 S. Commercial st.

A class "C" retail beer license was granted Floyd McNall for the cafe he will operate in connection with the new Trailways bus depot at Marion and High streets.

A bill was passed to add to present parking ordinance a restriction against vehicular parking on railroad tracks or near enough to interfere with train operations.

Lions Parade To Open Meet

NEW YORK, July 26. (AP)—Fifth avenue, New York City's street of shops and parades, echoed tonight to the blare of bands and the sound of marching feet as an estimated 15,000 costumed persons participated in the Lions International parade.

The parade was one of the highlights of the organization's 31st annual convention, which opened today with some 5,000 delegates from the 48 states and 23 foreign countries.

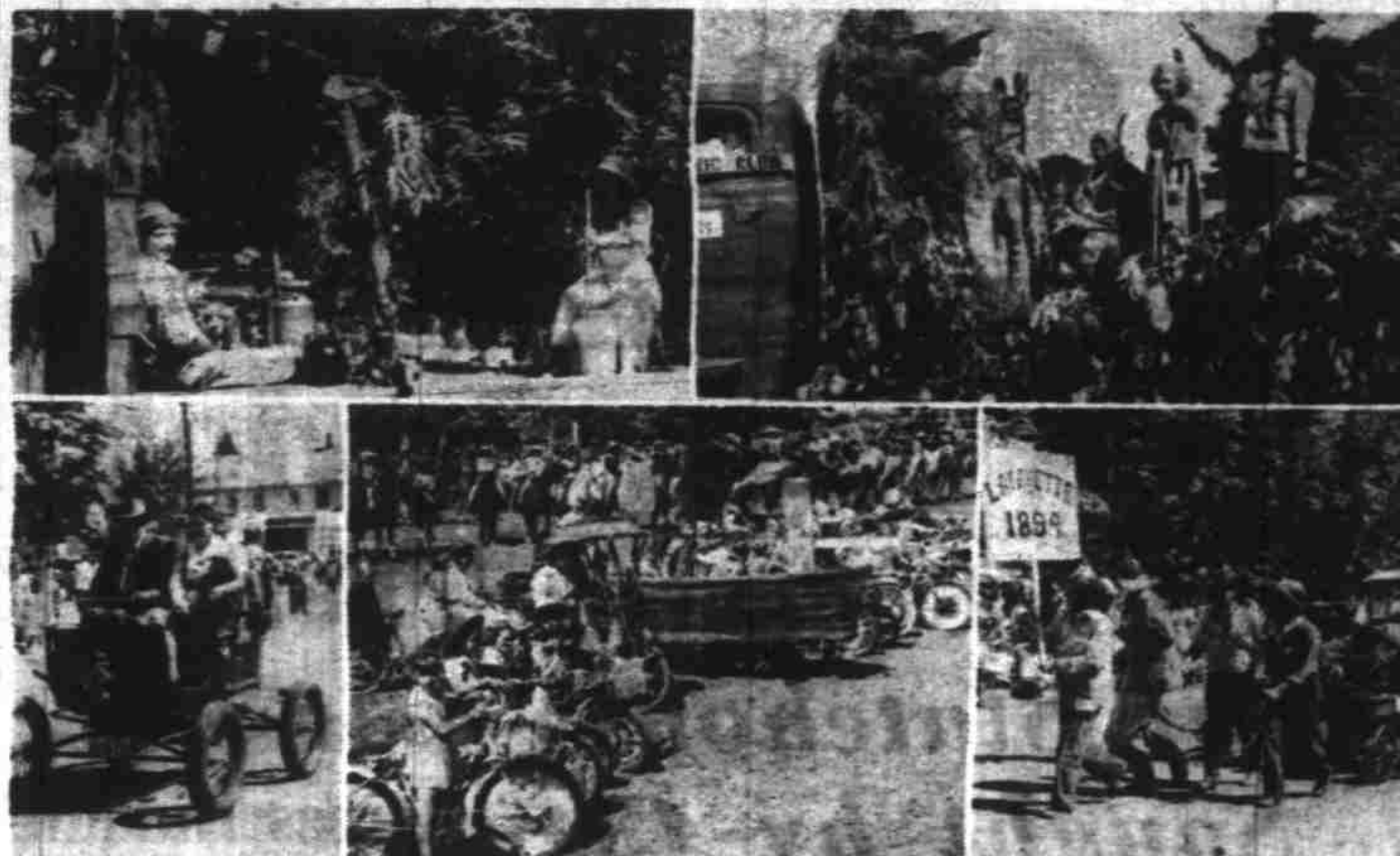

No Long Wait In Sight for 19-Year Draft

WASHINGTON, July 26. (AP)—Younger men won't have long to wait for the draft even if the "oldsters" of 25 tonight are taken first, officials said tonight.

This disclosure came as the senate armed services committee scheduled a meeting for tomorrow to talk over age and related questions with the selective service director, Maj. Gen. Leffis B. Hershey.

Draft headquarters said: "Even if all eligible 23 through 25s are called, they won't produce more than one month's quota."

2—Every male 19 through 25, who isn't deferable, "has an awfully good chance" of being in the army within two years.

Hershey estimated tonight there aren't more than 40,000 or 50,000 men aged 23 through 25 qualified for the draft. And officials expect to call around 30,000 a month.

U.S., Lewis Given Hearing Extension

WASHINGTON, July 26. (AP)—Trial Examiner William R. Ringer's national labor relations board today gave both sides until September 8 to submit briefs in the government's unfair labor practices move against John L. Lewis.

The government's charges arise from the United Mine Workers' new union shop agreement with soft coal operators. Ringer's action put off the chance of a court showdown for months or longer. Ringer now can't reach a decision much before Oct. 1. That would delay a full NLRB hearing until at least November 1, and many lawmakers think congress will amend the Taft-Hartley act in January if not sooner.

Arms Reduction Aim Collapses In U. N. Group

LAKE SUCCESS, July 26. (AP)—United Nations attempt to cut the world's armies and guns virtually collapsed today.

The issue, another battle between Russia and the western powers, is certain to go before the U. N. assembly in Paris this fall. Delegates here already have given up trying to agree on atomic controls.

By a 9 to 2 vote, the working committee of the U. N. commission on conventional armaments decided in effect there is no use talking about regulating and reducing armed forces and armaments until Russia and the other big powers agree on a U. N. police force, the atom is controlled, and peace treaties are made with Germany and Japan.

Jakob A. Malik, soviet deputy foreign minister, put in a new resolution calling for a general reduction of arms and armed forces, the prohibition of atomic weapons, and destruction of existing atomic bombs.

The committee adjourned without voting on the Russian proposal.

Welfare Board Fires Employee

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26. (AP)—The state public welfare commission today discharged a woman, who said she would appeal to the state civil service commission.

The welfare commission said Mrs. Julia Eaton was given notice because her "activities and public utterances reflect upon the public welfare commission and the state of Oregon and the U. S. government."

Mrs. Eaton said she was a correspondent for the Federated Press, a labor news service. One commission member said an article appearing in a San Francisco publication contained "unfounded criticism" of welfare activities during the recent flood.

Young Softball Player Struck

Mac Baker, 12, son of Dr. and Mrs. Paul D. Baker, Salem route 8, was found unconscious by Salem first aidmen and police Monday night at the corner of State and Commercial streets.

His condition was thought by police to be the result of being hit with a bat as he participated in a softball game with the Midget Market team earlier in the evening at Leslie field.

His father, Dr. Baker, reported that he suffered from a concussion and said he was still in a semi-conscious condition late Monday night. The boy was taken home by his mother and was being treated there by his father.

AIRPLANE PARTS STOLEN

Capt. James E. Cannon, of the Salem civil air patrol, reported to city police Monday that tuning instruments, instrument lights, a gyro compass and an intercom instrument plate were taken over the week end from the patrol's training plane near the senior high school work shops.

Cannon told police that the instrument panel of the plane had also been damaged by the thieves.

Italian Labor Factions Split

ROME, July 26. (AP)—Italy's labor forces split into two hostile camps today. The largest bloc is communist-controlled. The second faction has Catholic and government party backing.

Meanwhile, labor leaders in between these two groups were trying desperately to hold together the 7,000,000-member General Confederation of Labor (CGIL). The big confederation began cracking up a week ago after its communist-dominated executive committee called a disastrous general strike following the attempted assassination of communist boss Palmiro Togliatti.

The communist majority in the CGIL executive committee abandoned efforts today to maintain labor unity and in effect told Christian democrat and Catholic labor (ACLI) to "go ahead and form your own union."

TUNA PRICE DROPS

ASTORIA, Ore., July 26. (AP)—The price of albacore tuna, which went to a record \$650 a ton last week, dropped to \$580 today.

Forest Fire Fought Near Cottage Grove

EUGENE, Ore., July 26. (AP)—A 50-to-70 acre forest fire was reported out of control 12 miles east of Cottage Grove tonight.

The blaze, first noticed at noon, was being fought by 100 men. It was believed to have started in slashings. Wind spread it to old-growth stands.

War Memorial Dedicated by Town of Drain

DRAIN, July 26. (AP)—The \$100,000 living war memorial which was financed by this town of less than 1,000 people was formally dedicated yesterday.

The climax of five years of money-raising by Drain and nearby communities was witnessed by a crowd of 1,000.

A swimming pool, lighted baseball diamond and tennis courts comprise the north Douglas county living war memorial. Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, retired chancellor of the state system of higher education, presented a plaque.

Local residents, without borrowing a cent or obtaining any public funds, financed the big project by scrap drives, benefits, auctions, and donated work.

Two Bodies Found In Vanport Area

PORTLAND, July 26. (AP)—The Pacific northwest flood toll stood at 52 today, after the recovery of two more bodies from shattered Vanport.

The latest victims were Mrs. Camilla Dawley, 60, and her semi-invalid sister, Gerda Wennerlund, 65, discovered last night crushed in their apartment.

Thirteen more Vanport residents are still missing.
