Pacific Greyhound line Tuesday denied responsibility for a bus-truck collision last November 5 near Jefferson. Two persons died as a result of the accident.

The denial was contained in an answer to damage action filed by Anna M. Hanson of Silverton in Marion county circuit court June 17.

The bus lines in its answer Tuesday placed full blame for the collision on the Oregon Journal truck involved. The Journal Publishing company of Portland was named as co-defendant in the suit.

Mrs. Hansen maintained that she was a passenger in the bus at the time of the accident and that she incurred "severe and permanent" injuries. She seeks \$1,003 special damages and \$7,500 general damages.

The complaint charged both the bus and truck drivers with being negligent. The bus lines answered that the delivery truck was operated on the wrong side of the road, had defective brakes and was traveling at a speed "greater than was reasonable."

The accident, which occurred on a Pacific highway curve about three miles north of Jefferson, resulted in the death of Donald W. Billings of Portland, driver of the truck, and hospitalization of Gerald W. Jones of Eugene, bus driver, with broken legs.

Mrs. Maude Mahwinney of Portland, a bus passenger, died a few days later in a local hospital. A Marion county coroner's jury decided after the accident that Billings' death was caused by negligence of the bus driver.

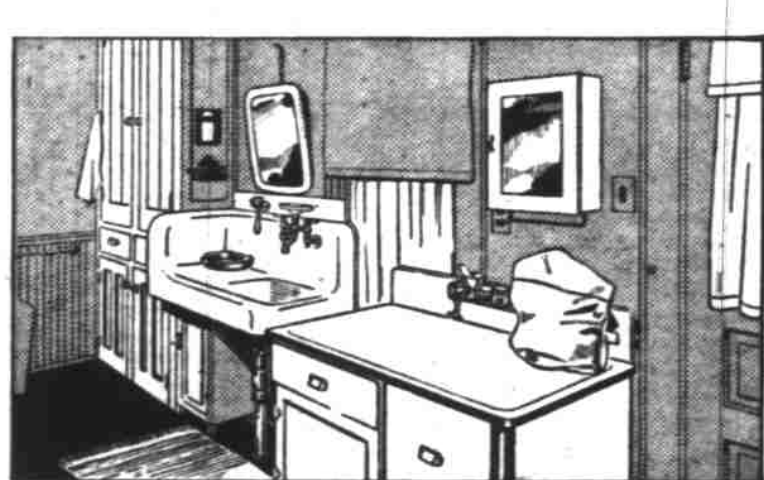

Recorder and DA Suggest Needs in New Courthouse

Suggestions for space requirements of the Marion county district attorney and recorder offices in the proposed new courthouse were received Tuesday by County Clerk Harlan Judd, secretary of the courthouse building commission.

Recorder Herman Lanke reported his staff would require an office measuring approximately 60 by 100 feet. He suggests that it be adjacent to the county clerk's office.

The recorder's office would include a private office and conference room, index and comparing room and space for title companies, stenographers, chief deputy, counter and desk and plenty of record and photostatic film storage space. A photo room would be shared with the clerk's office.

District Attorney Miller B. Hayden recommends that his office be located on the same floor as the circuit courts. He suggests separate offices for the district attorney, storage and records and for reception and stenographer's room, plus three offices for deputies.
