Prize Pictures Set for Sunday; Last Deadline in Photo Contest At Midnight Next Wednesday

Judges in The Oregon Statesman's photo contest had plenty of trouble choosing the best pictures entered by amateur photographers in the third week of competition, but they are finished today and their choices are ready for publication this Sunday.

Looking forward to the last week of the contest with its Wednesday, August 4, deadline, there are some hints that may be passed on so that possible entrants may take full advantage of this week-end to make pictures for the contest. Those that have entered the contest during the past weeks are invited to try again this final week, and those shutterbugs who have not sent in an entry are encouraged to dust off their lenses and put some of their photo ideas to work.

One of the prime requisites for a good contest photo is to make a picture that will tell a story. . . one that will be interesting to a complete stranger as well as be interesting only to a relative.

If a pictorial, the photo should be well balanced and composed, preferably with a central point of interest. Children and animal photos are the most difficult, but the most appealing. Generally, the child or animal's face should be readily seen, with a suitable background to make the subject stand out. For instance, if it is a light colored subject, choose a dark background.

All entrants should read the contest rules again and make certain that they comply. Many good photos have been ruled out of a contest when dull finish paper was used (thereby making reproduction difficult) instead of the glossy finish specified. Proper size is important, also, and spotted, stained or cracked pictures don't get far. Write the necessary data on a separate sheet of paper, then paste it on the back of the photo.

And after having taken much time and patience to get the set-up you want for a photo; after making certain that your shutter and diaphragm settings are correct; and after focusing your camera so that everything is needle sharp . . . take another minute and see that your entry is properly packaged for mailing or entry into the contest. It would be tragic to lose your prize photo or have it damaged at this point.
