States Allocated School Lunch Fund

WASHINGTON, July 29 —(AP) The agriculture department has allocated \$58,800,000 to the states and territories for the 1948-49 school lunch program.

Congress appropriated \$75,000,000 for the program, \$5,000,000 more than for the previous year. The lunch program seeks to

improve the dietary and nutritional standards of school children through the serving of balanced noon-hour meals, and to provide an enlarged market for farm products.

Apportionments by states and territories of funds for the 1948-49 program include: Oregon, \$470,722; Washington, \$679,624.

Klett Estate Value \$401,541

Appraisal of the estate of Otto A. Klett, Salem business man who died several months ago, totals \$401,541, according to a filing in Marion county probate court Thursday.

The estate consists of personal property appraised at \$46,391 and real property appraised at \$335,150. The real property consists of Crystal Gardens dance hall, valued at \$75,000, and Hollywood Bowl, appraised at \$65,000.

It also includes land and buildings at 440-442-444 State st., and seven business addresses on North Commercial street plus two houses at Claxter and land near the Hollywood Bowl.

Eventual End to Army's Racial Segregation Aim of New Order

WASHINGTON, July 29 —(AP)— President Truman said today his "equality of treatment and opportunity" order for the armed services is aimed at the eventual end of race segregation in the army.

Negroes are now kept in separate units in the army. A reporter at Mr. Truman's weekly news conference said that Gen. Omar Bradley has been quoted as saying he favors segregation among the lower echelons.

Is that consistent with the president's "equality" order of last Monday? he was asked.

Mr. Truman responded that he was informed by the secretary of the army Royal that Bradley, the army chief of staff, had made no such statement.

The president responded with a prompt and flat yes, when asked if his Monday order aims at an eventual end of segregation.

That order stated a presidential policy of equality of treatment and opportunity to be put into effect as soon as possible, "having due regard to the time required to effectuate any necessary changes without impairing efficiency or morale."
