DALLAS, Aug. 5—J. E. Smith, until June member of the Dallas city police force, was killed Tuesday in Elroy, Ariz., while attempting to recapture escaped prisoners.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Smith, and his brother, residents of the Pioneer Loop district, left immediately for Arizona upon receipt of word of the accident.

Smith, who had many years of experience as a police officer, resigned his job in Dallas to accept the Arizona work. While here he lived on the Falls City road near the city limits.

Survivors besides his parents and brother in Dallas include the widow and four children, the youngest in junior high school. One son is serving with the paratroopers in Greece.

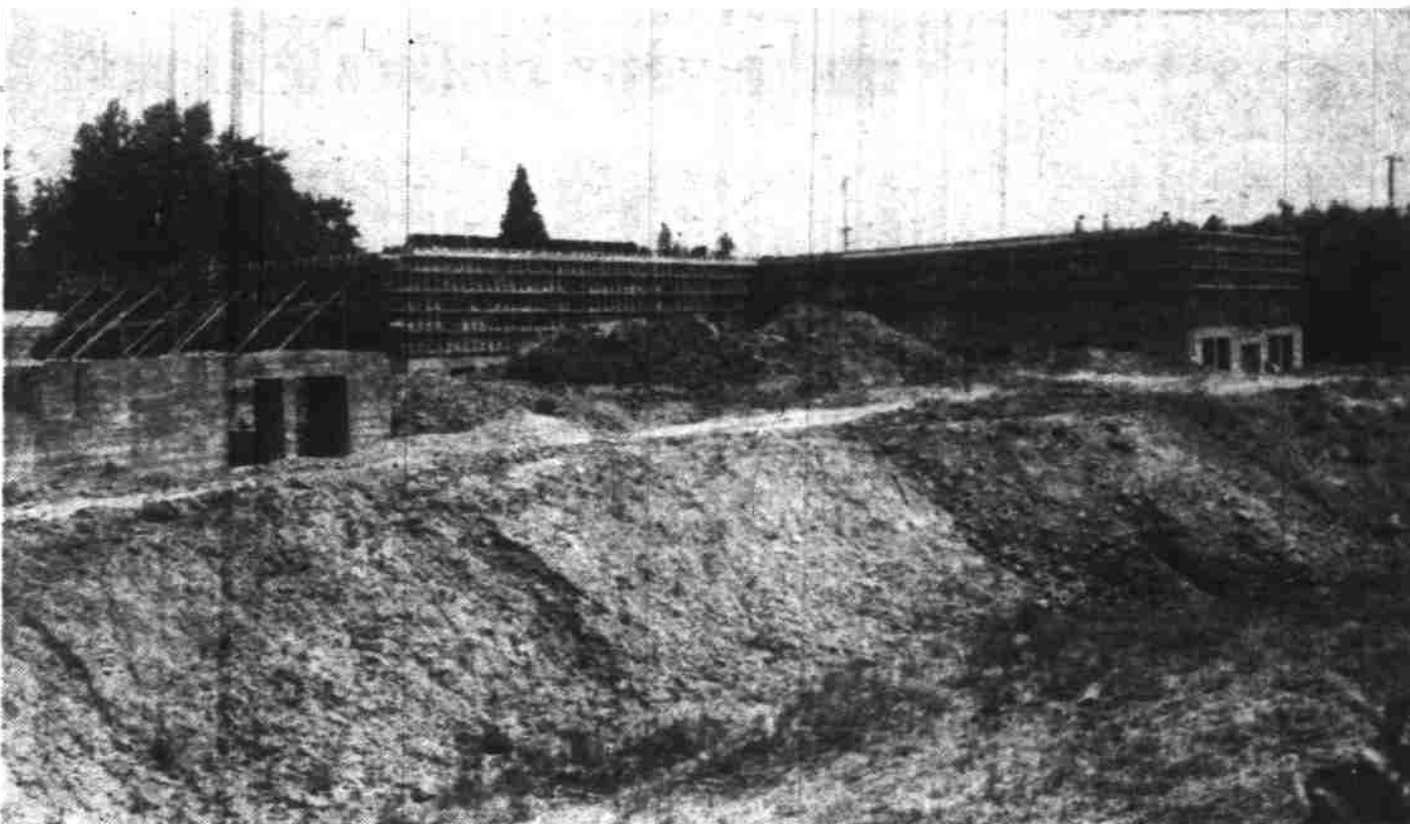
All officers and committees were retained. More than \$20 was donated for improvement of the picnic grounds.
