First Apples Appear for Green Sauce; Canning, Freezing Instructions Given

Dear old Gravenstein apples are getting pretty close to the applesauce stage. We've already used some of those which dropped off the tree, a little premature, but welcomed by all comers who have dined off them.

This year, aside from canning the applesauce, much of it will go into the locker. Applesauce is one of the backbones of our own canning closet.

Canned applesauce is very much a matter of taste, for each family seems to have a preference of some sort when this universally popular sauce is concerned.

First there's the method you prefer for making the sauce. Some prefer to peel and core the apples, and this is practical for fair-sized fruit, but when it's small and green, best to remove all spots and unclean portions, cook with water and run through a colander to remove cores and skins. Then put back on the stove and heat until sugar dissolves.

Some prefer to can the early sauce without sugar, adding it just before the sauce is to be used. If you're canning your applesauce, put it hot into jars and process for five minutes in boiling water. If to be frozen, be
