

# Crump Defeat Confirmed in Tennessee

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 6-(AP)—The potent E. H. Crump political dynasty of Memphis and a lesser democratic organization long allied with it in Tennessee went down in stunning defeat today as the final ballots were counted from yesterday's violence-punctuated elections.

While unofficial tabulations told a story of the Crump organization's thrashing in the statewide democratic primary, the state guard moved into Benton in southeast Tennessee to quell continuing election strife which has left two dead and five wounded following a Polk county general election.

And the bi-partisan good government league in Polk claimed a thumping victory, with the exception of three justices of the peace races, in its effort to unseat the democratic organization of former Sheriff Burch Biggs, which has controlled Polk for 18 years. The Biggs organization frequently has cooperated with Crump in state primaries.

National guardsmen, aided by the state highway patrol, moved in on Polk county on instructions of Gov. Jim McCard to restore and maintain order threatened by gunplay incident to the final tabulation of ballots in the county election.

Troopers Arrive — 85 in number — arrived a few minutes after a second ambush shooting within 24 hours. The first ended in the death of one man and wounding of another. In subsequent gunplay another man was slain and four injured.

Today's ambush was aimed at a heavily armed motorcade bringing in an election box from Cop-hill over near the North Carolina and Georgia line, to the county seat. The driver was cut by flying glass from the single shot. The landslide which engulfed the Crump forces was such as Crump himself had buried his opposition without setback in 20 years.

Crump's choice for the state's two top nominations — for U. S. senator and for governor — were soundly whipped.

McCard Beaten — Crump's choice for governor, incumbent Jim McCard, seeking third two-year term, carried only the tenth (Shelby county-Memphis) district and the first district in republican east Tennessee.

His senatorial candidate, John A. Mitchell, carried only his home district, the fourth in middle Tennessee, and the tenth. The state has ten districts.

Victors in the senatorial and gubernatorial contests were Estes Kefauver, veteran of 10 years in the lower house of congress, and Gordon Browning.

# 63 Perish in Ie Shima Blast

TOKYO, Saturday, Aug. 7-(AP)—Sixty-three persons were reported killed yesterday at Ie Shima when a small landing craft exploded while ammunition was being loaded from that tiny island off Okinawa.

The Far East air force said a report from air force officials on Okinawa listed 50 natives, 11 Filipino crew members and two enlisted men as the victims.

The landing craft was demolished, as was a smaller boat being used to move World War II stocks of ammunition from Ie Shima, the island on which War Correspondent Ernie Pyle was killed. The air force said planes from Okinawa shuttled throughout the night to Ie Shima with medical supplies and provisions.

# Reminder Given Of Drivers License Deadline Tuesday

All Oregon drivers licenses bearing the serial numbers 5R-462001 to 5R495000 must be renewed by Tuesday, August 31, under provisions of the revised license renewal system approved by the 1947 legislature. Secretary of State Earl T. Newby announced Friday.

All numbers below 5R462001 are now void. Licenses are expiring in blocks of 33,000 each month, according to the "5R" serial number on the face of each card. Newby said the printed expiration date is no longer correct in most cases.

Motorists planning out-of-state trips with licenses not yet due for renewal are being advised to attach a schedule to the license card as proof they are carrying a valid permit.

# Remington Said Fired as Result Of Red Probe

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6-(AP)—Rep. Mundt (R-SD) said tonight that William W. Remington, of the commerce department, who has been accused of supplying information to a Russian spy network, "has been removed from his job."

Mundt said on a radio program (Mutual) that this is one useful result that has come from congressional investigation of Soviet espionage activities. He said that previously Remington had been on vacation and on leave from his commerce department position but has been removed from the job since the hearings began.

Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer has announced that Remington, who was in the office of international trade, has been placed on "indefinite leave" until the question of his associations has been cleared up. A spokesman for the department said tonight that was still the situation, that Remington had not been "fired."

Mundt is acting chairman of the house un-American activities committee, which has been conducting one phase of the spy inquiry. Remington has been a major witness before a senate subcommittee headed by Senator Ferguson (R-Mich) which is concerned with government loyalty checks.

# U.S., British to Sell Farben Plants

FRANKFURT, Germany, Aug. 6-(AP)—American and British authorities announced today that scores of plants of the huge I. G. Farben chemical combine will be offered for sale soon.

One U. S. officer estimated the number of properties involved at "about 50."

An announcement said the sale is designed to keep the billion dollar trust from being reconstituted.

# Colorado Ammo Dump Explodes

PUEBLO, Colo., Aug. 7-(AP)—Howard Miller, of the Pueblo Chief, said tonight that "an ammunition dump" at the Pueblo ordinance depot, nine miles east of the city, had blown up.

The newspaperman said the explosion was thought to have been caused by lightning.

He said preliminary reports indicated no one was injured.

# Record Breaking Women in Olympic Finish

# Superforts End 'Routine' Flight Around World

TUCSON, Ariz., Aug. 6-(AP)—Space-slashing B-29's roared in and out of Davis-Monthan air force base today, cutting the world down to unimpressive size from a military standpoint.

Two superfortresses completed the first round-the-world flight by the big bombers as dawn was breaking over this desert spring-board for hops to every section of the globe.

Stepping from the first plane to hit the runway, Lt. Col. Richard W. Kline of Haskell, Tex., remarked:

"Round-the-world flights can now be classed as routine stuff for B-29's."

The globe-girdling planes returned 15 days after departure, flying in from Anchorage, Alaska on the last leg. They made eight stops all told.

One of the three B-29's which took off on the world flight went down in the sea off Aden, South-east Arabia, killing 17 of its crew of 18.

# Japs Ignore Walkout Ban

TOKYO, Saturday, Aug. 7-(AP)—A small force of section hands on the government railway on Shikoku today became the first to defy the new "no-strike" ban issued by the Japanese cabinet.

The cabinet ordered an immediate investigation and threatened criminal prosecution.

The big test is expected later today with the expiration of a strike deadline set by the big government communication workers union. The union has said it will defy the government ban.

The section workers struck "for an indefinite period" late yesterday in the area of Matsuyama, west coast city of Shikoku, smallest of the four Japanese home islands.

# Cat 'Mailed' To Silverton

Finding a home for an unwanted cat is beyond ordinary duty of a U. S. mail carrier, but Star Route Carrier A. M. Vistica of Woodburn performed just that extra service this week.

While loading mail at the rear of Salem postoffice he noticed a sleeping cat atop a mail pile as a stranger to the postoffice. As he unloaded his Silverton mail an hour later, Vistica was surprised to find the same cat among his mail sacks.

He left the cat with the Silverton postoffice force who in turn found a home for it.

# Duncan Resigns as Cannery Manager

SILVERTON, Aug. 6 — J. S. Duncan, manager of the Kolstad Cannery Co. here for over three years, resigned today. He gave no reason for the resignation. He has no plans for the future other than to take a vacation.

L. E. Kolstad, president of the corporation, will take over duties as manager.

# STATE LAMB CROP SMALL

PORTLAND, Aug. 6-(AP)—The smallest Oregon lamb crop on record was reported today by the department of agriculture. The year's crop was listed at 604,000, about 5 per cent under last year's and 44 per cent under average. Records date back to 1924.

# Marie to Push Controversial Economic Bill

PARIS, Aug. 6-(AP)—Andre Marie's new government today sought emergency powers from the national assembly to cope with France's financial problems.

Coupled with an economic reform bill presented to the finance committee of the assembly was the admission that is to all practical effect France is broke.

The measure is politically explosive and the chances are that Premier Marie may be forced to demand a vote of confidence in his 10-day-old government before assembly debate is concluded.

The bill proposed in general terms:

1. Reductions in France's sprawling bureaucracy, civil as well as military.
2. Tax reform, including possible increases in levies on business.
3. Reorganization of many nationalized and semi-nationalized agencies and industries, such as the railroads, banks, automobile and airplane factories.
4. Authority for the government to order its reforms by decree without specific legislative action.

# FSA Chieftain Retaliates to Studebaker

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6-(AP)—Federal Security Administrator Oscar R. Ewing, on the griddle for his dealings with a cook and a commissioner, today:

1. Said former commissioner of education John W. Studebaker used such poor judgement he had planned to fire him, but said Ewing, he "beat me to the gun" by resigning.

2. Flatly denied Studebaker's charges accusing Ewing of poor administration and of suppressing office of education attacks against communism.

3. Acknowledged that he had used a government hospital cook to prepare meals at the FSA, he explained, the budget bureau had assured him the procedure was proper and added it will continue.

His blast against Studebaker followed a letter from Studebaker released to newspapers last Sunday, accusing Ewing of interfering with the office of education program for promoting democracy in schools.

Ewing told a news conference that this was all "pure poppycock and irrelevant and irresponsible innuendo." He said it doesn't require a sensitive nose to detect "an aroma of politics and pique."

Studebaker said one of his staff member's speeches criticizing communism had been censored. Ewing said today that Studebaker had failed to mention that another part of the speech had been deleted which called congressmen "miserable objects" and worse.

"Where would we be if a thing like that got out?" he asked. Planned Discharge

As to Studebaker, Ewing said he had planned to discharge him because he was absent from his post so often on personal business. He said Studebaker was in San Diego and Los Angeles for 121 days during the year April 1947 to April 1948.

Ewing said the Federal Communications commission granted a license Aug. 1, 1947 to Studebaker, his son and another person for a radio station in San Diego.

He said Studebaker was very resentful when question about his absence from his office.

# 3,500 DROWNED IN CHINA

NANKING, Aug. 6-(AP)—Official Chinese government reports today said 3,500 persons were drowned and 400,000 made homeless by the flooding Yellow river in northern Honan province.

# Dewey Gets 'No' After Asking for DP Bill Revision

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6-(AP)—Republican presidential nominee Thomas E. Dewey got his first "no" from capitol hill today when a senate subcommittee turned down his request to liberalize the displaced persons bill at this special session.

Senator Revercomb (R-W Va) said Dewey asked revision of the law, which has been criticized by a number of republicans and democrats on the ground that it discriminates against many Jews and Catholics.

Revercomb, chairman of the judiciary subcommittee, said "I emphatically deny" that the bill is discriminatory. Revercomb added that the issue cannot be "dealt with in haste or under pressure" and should be explored at hearings at the regular congressional session next year.

# State's Traffic Toll Over 40 for Third Consecutive Month

Oregon traffic accidents claimed 40 lives in July to reach that mark for the third consecutive month, Secretary of State Earl T. Newby reported Friday.

Urban areas accounted for nine of the deaths, with rural areas and open highway smashups claiming 31 deaths. Sharp increases in traffic volumes coupled with the three-day Fourth of July holiday contributed heavily to the month's fatalities, Newby declared.
