Belluschi Given Courthouse Requirements

Preliminary steps to building a new Marion county courthouse sit under way here Friday when Pietro Belluschi, Portland architect named to design the building, met with the courthouse building commission.

Belluschi returned to Portland with a completed list of suggested office space plans from the various county offices. He indicated he would begin work immediately on designing the building.

Belluschi's contract with the Marion county court also was reviewed and approved by both parties Friday. Attending the meeting in addition to the architect were County Judge Grant Murphy and Commissioner Ed Rogers, Charles A. Sprague and Karl Steiner and County Clerk Harland Judd, secretary to the building commission.

Four-story Building Tentative plans call for a four-story building and basement, although no definite commitments have been made. Opinion in the commission appears to favor establishment of the more heavily patronized county offices on the ground floor.

These would probably include clerk, recorder, tax collector, assessor and county clerk. Other offices might be included on the second floor with the various circuit and district courts on the third floor. Sheriff Denver Young has requested the county jail be on the top floor with an office, however, for his staff on the main floor.

Requests For Space Requests for office space totals about 68,000 square feet. The entire building, however, is expected to contain almost 100,000 square feet when space for hallways, lobbies, elevator, basement and rest rooms is added.

No exterior finish for the building has been agreed upon by the building commission is considering marble facing and also a type of gray granites from Hebo mountain on the coast.

Horsemen to Start Project

Ground breaking ceremonies for what will eventually be an \$80,000 horse center south of Salem will take place Saturday, August 14, it was reported Friday.

The Willamette valley horsemen group, consisting of the Salem Saddle club and Oregon Mounted posse, will conduct ceremonies at the 35-acre site on South River road at 10 a. m. Douglas McKay of Salem will give the main address.

Ground breaking Saturday will be for a rodeo grounds and race track. A stadium is expected to go up next year, club officials said.

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Burglar Admits Several More Salem Thefts

Several Salem burglaries in the past few months were cleared up Friday when police questioned Glenn Edward DeHart, Silverton Hills, who was arrested Thursday while burglarizing a Sublimity store.

Hundreds of items, valued at several thousand dollars, were recovered by police Friday at the home of Dorothy Carney, 225 Hollywood ave. She was apprehended with DeHart at the time of the arrest by Deputy Sheriff William DeVall.

The number of burglaries to which DeHart confessed rose to 22 Friday. Most of the loot recovered had been identified. On some of his activities, however, DeHart was hazy as to dates and addresses.

DeHart told police he entered the home of J. L. Jeffries, 585 Richmond st., on May 25 and made off with a metal box containing \$1,800 in war bonds and other valuable papers and contracts. He said he burned the contents.

Three radios were recovered along with a stolen bike. Also quantities of food, cigarettes, candy, jewelry were found. DeHart also admitted looting a number of taverns in and about Salem.

DeHart is in Marion county jail awaiting action of the grand jury. His companion charged innocent to the same plea and preliminary hearing has been set for August 19. Both are held in the jail in lieu of \$2,000 bail each. They were apprehended while DeHart was prowling Ditter's General store in Sublimity early Thursday morning.

State Racing Fund Allotted

Distribution of \$75,200 of state racing revenues to the counties was announced Friday by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry. Each county received \$2,088 for the benefit of their county fairs.

Other shows receiving their share of the racing monies previously include: Oregon state fair \$35,000, Pacific International Livestock exposition \$35,000, Eastern Oregon Livestock show \$7,500, Mid-Columbia Livestock show \$5,000, Pendleton Roundup \$7,500, Northwestern Turkey show \$3,000, Klamath Basin Roundup \$5,000, spring lamb and dairy show \$2,500, Pacific Coast Turkey exhibit \$2,400 and Oregon state corn show \$2,500.

Jobless Claims Continue Low

With Oregon employment at continuing high levels, jobless benefits were lower in July than in any month since September, 1945, it was reported Friday by the state unemployment compensation commission.

Payments to unemployed workers totaled \$370,495 last month and readjustment allowance for war veterans \$207,876. The workers' benefits were 26 per cent below the amount paid a year ago in July and the veterans' benefits 5 1/2 per cent less.

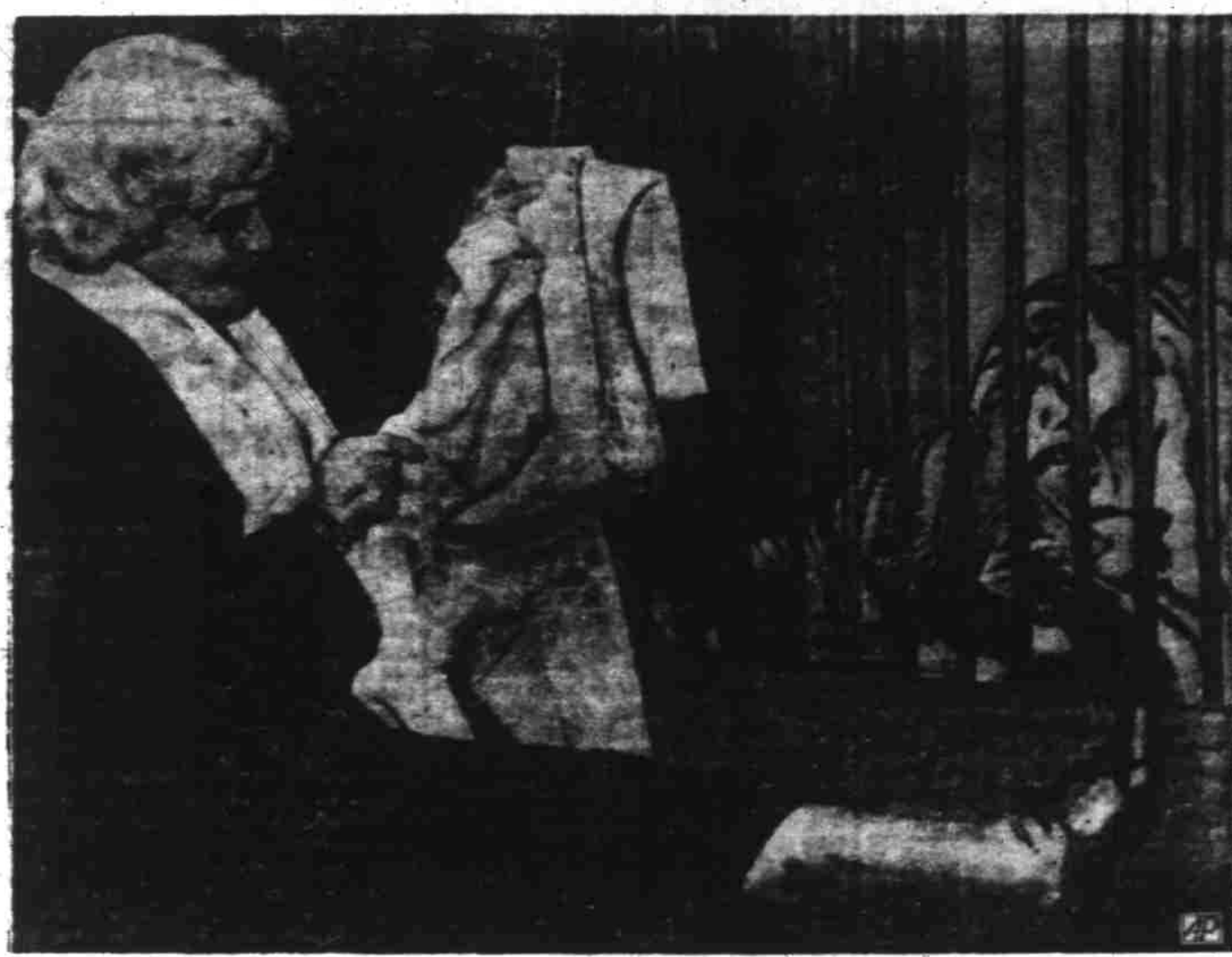
The Salem, Albany and Lebanon employment offices all paid less than half the amounts in benefits, compared with the same month last year.

Roads, Bridges Open Despite Repair Work

Repairs to Marion county roads and bridges are continuing this week but all roads are open to travel over the week end, Marion County Commissioner Roy Rice said Friday.

Travelers were advised by Rice, however, to stay off the Salem-Silverton highway from Middle Grove school to about five miles north. This section of road is badly torn up and is being rebuilt by state crews.

Oiling of county roads will be completed in the Abiqua district today and crews are expected to move into the Crooked Finger area east of Silverton for several days next week and then down onto the Mt. Angel roads, Rice said.

Work on rebuilding a long county bridge over the Little Fudgling river near the east end of Lake Labish bottom is expected to start next week. The replacing of planking and piling will not hold up traffic, however, it was reported.

Court Quashes Road Projects

A petition seeking improvement of roads in a new area just north of Salem was denied Friday by Marion county court.

The court acted on the suggestion of Marion County Engineer Hedda Swart reported earlier this week. Swart, who investigated the request that the roads be taken over as county roads and maintained, stated that the proposal did not meet the requirements for county roads.

The roads, all lying east of Cherry avenue, include Shady lane, Pleasant View, Candlewood and Clearview drives, Alder and Brooks avenues, and Filbert and Gary streets. They serve a large number of residents in that district.

In their petition to the court, the residents declared their roads were almost impassable in the winter time. The court's order explained Friday that the roads do not serve a school, church, cemetery, public building, nor are they market or connecting roads.

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Aroma Like Peppermint Candy Near in Santiam Valley, as Mint Growers Prepare Stills

JEFFERSON—Peppermint farmers are repairing distilleries and getting in readiness for mint distilling which will begin in this area about August 20. Several are installing new water tube boilers in their distilleries, replacing their old and out-moded boilers. The new boilers cost around \$7,000 to install but are said to save up to one-third in fuel.

Stills built this year and installing the new-type boilers include those of Oliver Stephenson and Bill Hart on Greens Bridge road, Keith Allen of Talbot, Henry Turnidge just east of the new highway bridge near Talbot. Another new still is that of Delmer Davidson and Herman Kieper, near the Davidson house west of Talbot.

Improving their distilleries by installing the new boilers are George Potts, Jr., and Nelson Gilmore, Talbot.

Mike Helms, grower southwest of here, is pulling flues this week, getting his boiler ready to start distilling on August 23.

E. B. Henningsen at Talbot is putting new flues in his boiler on the island and will start distilling about the 20th.

Jasper Turnidge at Talbot will start his still on August 20.

Dave Turnidge, grower and buyer at Talbot, says that stilling will probably be going full blast around the 21st.

Clifton Plagman, grower near Crabtree, put in a new distillery last year with a big navy boiler. He is making more improvements on his equipment this year.

Salem High School Diplomas Awarded to Total of 208 Vets

Salem High school has awarded 208 diplomas in the past three years to World War II veterans who had not finished their formal schooling.

This substitute for belated high school attendance, one of the benefits to which veterans of the recent war are entitled, is accomplished through comprehensive examinations offered here and at 15 other

Veterans who pass the series of five tests are considered on the educational level of a regular high school graduate and may receive a state education department certificate or a diploma from a high school if he attended there formerly, to receive due recognition for college entrance, civil service and other employment requiring secondary education.

The examinations are still given at any time to veterans who submit their discharge papers and apply to the Salem high principal's office where tests are administered by Secretary Kathleen Guck. Charge for the examination is \$2.25 here. An applicant may take the five tests separately, at different times, and may spend as long as he wishes on any test, provided he remains in the examination room. The five tests cover grammar, literature, mathematics, social studies and science.

The educational tests are given in only two other Willamette valley points, Portland (at Reed college or at the counseling center at 220 N. E. Beech st.) and Oregon State college, Corvallis.

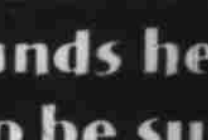

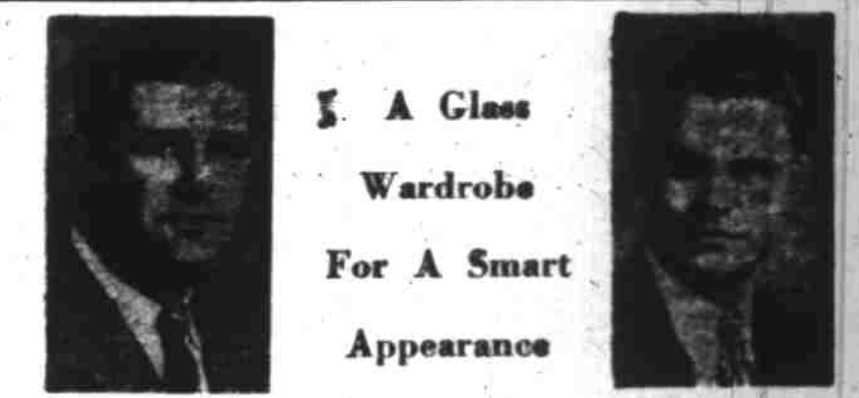
