Mohler Author Of Article On Reclamation

C. E. Mohler, engineer in the bureau of reclamation project planning office in Salem, is the author of an article in the August issue of the bureau's publication, Reclamation Era, concerned with irrigation water supply on the Columbia river.

The water in The Dalles project is to be lifted more than twice as high as ever before for irrigation, as much as 800 feet from the Columbia to hillside orchards, according to the article. The project is also the first to be approved by the interior department on the recommendation that sprinkling facilities, rather than canals and ditches, be provided for all irrigable lands.

Feasibility of the plan was said to be due to low cost power available from Bonneville dam.
