29th Polk Fair August 26-28

MONMOUTH, Aug. 7—Twenty-ninth Polk county fair will be held here August 26, 27 and 28. No admission will be charged at the gate.

Civic organizations from the three larger Polk county towns, Monmouth, Independence and Dallas, will furnish entertainment, each for a day, Monmouth on Thursday, Independence on Friday and Dallas on Saturday.

Livestock entries will be limited to Polk 4-H clubs, and winners will go on to the state fair the following week. Displays of 4-H club sewing and a fashion revue will be presented at the local high school building. Showmanship of livestock will be competitive interest for the 4-H club members.

Other exhibits are open to the public for entry, including canned fruit and vegetables, baked foods, fancy work, art work, flower, fresh fruit and vegetable displays.

L. H. McBee of Dallas is long-time president of the fair board, and Josiah Willis, county school superintendent of Polk, is secretary.

Hopes Revived for Broadway Street Extension Plans

New hope for the extension Broadway street from inside the city north to a junction with North River road was expressed Saturday by Marion County Engineer Hedda Swart. Word was received from C. L. Gardner, state highway right-of-way agent, that he would return to Salem on Wednesday and proceed with right-of-way negotiations for the strip.

The construction, which would

open a new artery into the city center from the north, would include 3,400 feet, of which about 1,250 feet is in the city limits.

Swart said it is hoped that the roadway will be graded by fall in order that it may be hard-surfaced next year.

Diking District Petition Faulty

Petitions for creation of a diking district in the Keizer area contain incorrect descriptions and some improper names, Marion

County Assessor R. Shelton said Saturday.

He notified petitioners that the descriptions of property should be redrawn and that recirculation was necessary because some names of non-residents were in-

cluded, his office's inspection showed. He said it would be impossible now for this to be accomplished in time for the district to be created and appear on the current tax rolls.
