Moratorium Urged On Cutting Forest Grazing Permits

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 — (AP) The house public lands committee Monday recommended again a three-year moratorium on reductions in national forest grazing permits.

The committee said in a report on public lands policies that this was the only one of several recommendations which it had made with respect to national forest grazing which has not been carried out by the secretary of agriculture.

The recommendations were made in a preliminary report of the committee last October.

Arguing for the three-year moratorium on permits, the committee said that "experienced stockmen strongly feel that the range is decidedly on the upgrade, as will clearly be demonstrated in the three-year period." The report added:

"The continued scarcity of meat and fibre for domestic consumption and to supply the world needs, with consequent higher prices, makes imperative the adoption of this proposal, in our considered judgment."
