DeHart Adds More Thefts To Confession

Glen Eddie DeHart added two more burglaries to his long list of admissions Wednesday when he told Sheriff Denver Young of stealing money and jewelry from the homes of A. W. Crocker, Salem route 8, and Ray Cozall Brooks. The sheriff reports that DeHart, a Silverton Hills resident, has admitted 32 burglaries since his arrest at Sublimity August 5.

DeHart admitted taking two \$20 gold pieces, one \$10 gold piece, \$118 in currency and \$10 in change from the Crocker residence. Loot from the Cozall residence included a white-gold ladies wrist watch, a Waltham ladies wrist watch and your pairs of earrings.

Earlier the sheriff took DeHart on a tour of the Salem area at which time he pointed out several burglarized homes and stores. He confessed taking \$993 in currency from Behm's market, 3910 State st., July 11. From the Clarence D. Herr residence in Central Howell he took a .22 caliber rifle.

DeHart told Young that he sold a box of watches and jewelry from his loot on the streets of Portland over the July 4 weekend.

State Accepts Progressive Party Filing

State department officials announced here Wednesday they had accepted the filing of Mrs. Peggy Carlson, Brightwood, as the progressive party nominee for representative in congress from the third congressional district (Multnomah county).

She lives in the first congressional district. Her name will appear on the November ballot unless restrained by the courts.

State Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland, probably will file a suit to restrain the certification of Mrs. Carlson, he said in Salem Tuesday.

Mrs. Carlson was nominated at a progressive party convention in Portland several weeks ago. She would oppose Homer Angell, republican incumbent, and Roland Bartlett, democrat.

Dog License Fees Received

Dog owners throughout Marion county were beginning to put Rover on a lawful basis this week, and Ervin A. Ward, county dog control enforcement officer, reported that license fees were rolling in.

Ward is establishing temporary headquarters in towns about the county in a drive to pick up delinquent fees. In a two-day stand at Woodburn about 40 licenses were purchased. Wednesday at Silverton approximately 20 dog owners paid fees. Ward said he would be at the Silverton city hall again today and Friday to receive fees in that area. He will announce his next stop later in the week.

Salem dog owners were beginning to match the drive also, with 35 fees paid at the county clerk's office since the campaign began. Ward said that after time is given delinquents to pay up voluntarily, he will start court action against non-conformers.

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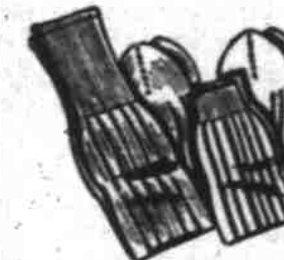
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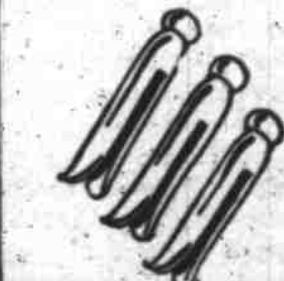
