Jefferson Council Likes Business Tax

JEFFERSON — Declaring that the revenue from the new city business tax had already been included in the city budget for the coming year, city officials at their meeting Monday night decided to retain the ordinance for the ensuing year. This ordinance, levying a \$15 tax on each business, has been the subject of much controversy since first proposed. Robert Downing, city recorder, was instructed to send final notices to all business places that have not yet paid.

The night marshal, George Armstrong, was allowed four cents a mile for use of his car while on duty, monthly mileage not to exceed 500 miles. Salary of Mrs. Martha Hutchings, city treasurer, was raised from \$2.50 per month to \$10 per month beginning August 1.

Building of a city jail was discussed and the matter turned over to Francis Phelos, councilman, to determine cost, etc.

Bean Canning Underway In Silverton Operation

SILVERTON—Cool weather has retarded growth of the beans in the Silverton area. L. E. Kolstad, proprietor of the Kolstad cannery reports, but said yield on the 110 acres in the locality is satisfactory.

Canning of beans has started but the crew will be increased to 200 when the peak is reached.

Kolstad will supervise the Silverton plant personally, following the resignation of J. S. Duncan, former manager, and has moved his brokerage office from Seattle to here.

Berry Exports Increase Five-Fold

Shipments to other states of Oregon strawberries for freezing during July were five times as great as in July, 1947, W. L. Close, state department of agriculture shipping inspector, said Thursday.

The shipments totaled 109 carloads.

Total shipments of Oregon fruits, vegetables and berries to other states were 1,058 carloads in July, of which 797 were potatoes. The July shipments were 500 cars under July, 1947, because the harvest season is late this year.
