Coffee Shop Remains Open Despite Picket

Only one Salem restaurant, the Salem Hotel Coffee shop, was struck Thursday by the culinary alliance local, but it remained open.

Meanwhile, union action regarding seven other downtown eating establishments was awaiting arbitration today by an international officer. The strike, for higher wages, had been slated to begin at 11 a.m. Thursday.

"The eight downtown restaurants will definitely remain open today, no matter what happens," Restaurateur Ralph Nohlgren said last night after a meeting of the proprietors.

The union's business agent, A. B. Pederson, said Gertrude Sweet of Portland, international vice president of the alliance, would arrive here today to direct further negotiations with the employers.

The struck restaurant continued to do business after its employees left at 12:17 p.m., and while a picket walked the sidewalk in front of the shop.

Six of the union employees of the coffee shop kept up operations along with some non-union help after that time, said F. K. Woerth, proprietor.

Pederson refused to divulge the reason for the walkout at the single establishment, and Woerth said he did not know the reason. The employer stated that he refused to continue negotiations with the union because "my employees were satisfied." He said he was paying them more than the pay scale requested.

George Weatherly Dies in Portland

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—(AP)—George Warren Weatherly, an 80-year-old native Portlander who made a fortune out of ice cream, died in a hospital today.

Weatherly, who once manufactured 90 per cent of Oregon's ice cream, helped popularize the ice cream cone. The cone-making machine was invented by one of his employees.

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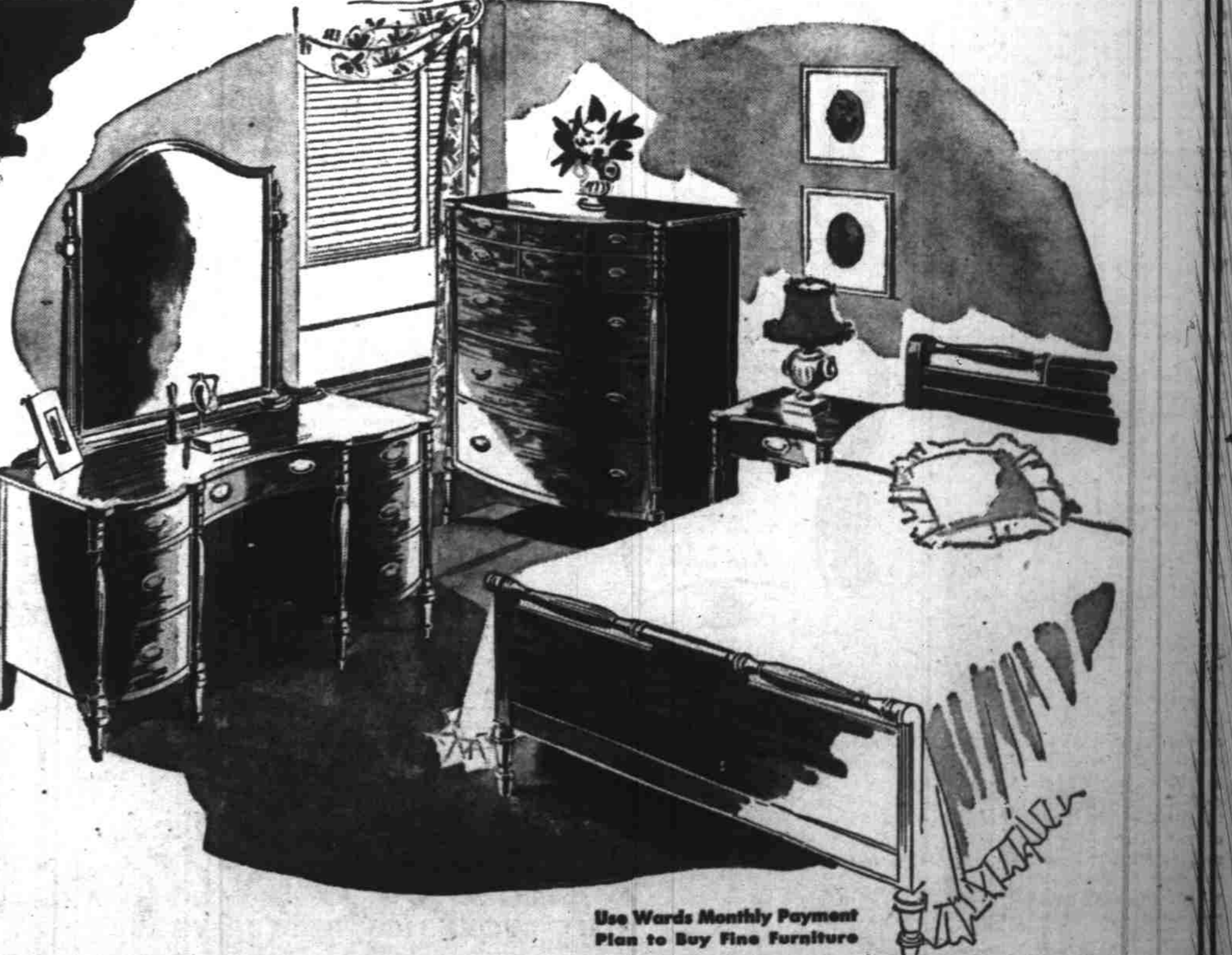
