

Boys Added to DeHart Case, Held for Thefts

Two teen-age boys are being held in the county juvenile ward on charges of burglarizing several homes and bringing the loot to the home of Dorothy Carney, 225 Hollywood ave. Sheriff Denver Young said the articles were recovered from the house Friday.

With the announcement that the pair had been implicated in the prolific burglary case of Glenn Edward DeHart, Young disclosed that DeHart had admitted three more burglaries. Latest confession by DeHart fixed responsibility for burglaries of Alvin's cafe on highway 98E, south of Salem; the Four-Five-Six tavern near Canby; and the home of Grover C. Pomroy, 444 N. Capitol st.

Loot from the cafe included some cash, food, cigarettes and meat. A .25 caliber Colt automatic pistol was taken from Pomroy's residence. DeHart said he was surprised by the tavern owner after entering the building and was forced to flee empty handed.

Articles allegedly stolen by the juveniles included a large quantity of men's clothes taken at Molalla; two electric shavers from Ames Hardware store in Silverton; and other miscellaneous items. Young also recovered a missing \$40 goldpiece from the Carney residence. It was stolen from the home of W. C. Crocker, Salem route 9 about a month ago.

Credit Group Berates Return Of Controls

Overwhelming opposition to governmental controls over credit was expressed by members of the Salem Retail Credit association at Friday's luncheon in the Golden Pheasant. Most members surveyed urged that controls should be exercised by business on the basis of each firm's and each customer's situation.

Charles Schmitz, secretary, averred that the large number of inexperienced persons entering business since the war had aided in the installment buying boom and, consequently, in the renewal of wartime controls on installment credit recently decreed by congress.

Opinions of members as to the general credit picture ranged from "fair" to "dangerous," but most noted that a careful watch was essential. Francis Smith, manager of Credit Bureaus, suggested that federal tightening of credit might "chop off the market" by removing many buyers and start such a slide as 1929's.

It was stated that many persons still have nest-eggs of savings, but that more are trying to buy goods out of current incomes.

Dewey to Visit Coast on Tour

SEATTLE, Aug. 13—(P)—Hugh D. Scott, Jr., republican national chairman, said today that it is safe to assume that Governor Thomas E. Dewey will visit the west coast in his campaign for the presidency.

The Philadelphia said the itinerary for the campaign is still indefinite. It will not be opened, he said, until shortly after labor day.

Scott, who has just concluded a conference with Dewey, will go to Portland tomorrow to meet with Governor Earl Warren of California, the republican vice presidential nominee.

16 New Faces Among WU's Fall Faculty

Willamette university will have at least 16 new faces among its faculty members when fall term opens in September.

Several of the new instructors have already taken up duties with the summer sessions at the school and the remainder will be on hand to greet students when the new term begins.

Latest member to join the faculty is Dr. George C. Seck. He will head the department of psychology. Dr. Seck graduated from Nebraska Wesleyan university, earned his master of arts degree at Boston university and became a doctor of philosophy at the University of Michigan. He comes to Willamette from Iowa state college.

New Dean of College
Dr. Robert D. Gregg from Carnegie Tech is new dean of the college of liberal arts. In addition to administrative duties he will teach courses in American history.

Dr. Robert M. Haley, new head of the economics and business administration department, is a graduate of Harvard and Northwestern universities. Another addition to the department is James I. Elliot, who will teach accounting.

Speech and dramatics students will have two new teachers with the appointments of James W. Kirkwood as professor of speech and Edward T. Gibson, assistant professor of speech and drama. Kirkwood is competing for his philosophy doctorate at UCLA and Gibson is a graduate of Michigan and Wayne universities. He has been active in dramatics in New York and Detroit for many years.

Joining Dr. Seck in the psychology department will be Charles Henry Derthick. Derthick joins the Willamette staff from the University of Kansas.

Among those already on the campus is Thomas Gillies, who has assumed responsibilities as assistant librarian and instructor in English. Holding degrees from Michigan, Cornell and Columbia universities, Gillies served in the army during World War II.

Howard P. Hinde, graduate of Park college and Oklahoma university, will be acting instructor in zoology during the leave of Dr. Cecil R. Monk.

Heads Frasco Teaching
Edward Charles Kollmann, assistant professor of philosophy is one of two members joining the faculty from Harvard university. A graduate of Bowdoin college, he served two years with the army air force chemical warfare branch. Second addition from Harvard is Dr. Kenneth Verne Lottick, who will be associate professor of education. He will have charge of practice teaching this year.

Teaching theory of music and instructing organ will be Elwood Ball from the University of Michigan. Assisting in the mathematics department will be Kermit Grover Clemens, graduate of the University of Minnesota.

Geraldine M. Moroney, a new instructor in history, comes to Willamette from Vanderbilt university.

Sociologist Dies
Alfred W. Sheets, assistant professor of sociology from the University of Southern California, will join Dr. John Rademaker in that department.

The university will have courses in training for YMCA and YWCA service again this year with the addition of Frederick H. O. Cords to the staff. Associated with the Salem YMCA, Cords will instruct in group work and in history, philosophy and organization of the YMCA.

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 13—(P)—A champion's son won the Oregon ram sale sheep dog trial here today. Hemp, son of Tweed, gathered, drove and penned five sheep for 51.4 of a possible 55 points.

His father last year at Salt Lake City scored 51.5 points to win the national championship. The 18-month-old collie, owned by James S. Palmer of Dixon, Calif., far outclassed his closest competitor, Tony, who had 42.5 points. Karl Wipper of Turner owns Tony.

Tweed, a dog that starred in a motion picture, gave an exhibition of handling sheep at the end of the competition. He also is owned by Palmer.

Third place went to the Oregon state champion, Pal, owned by Addie Aherns, Turner. The judges gave Pal 27 2-3 points.

Personal Radio Nears Reality

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13—(P)—"Personal radio" which will give you your own private broadcasting station — is just about ready for launching into American life.

The federal communications commission said today it will shortly begin licensing individuals "for personal and private communication" in this field—a civilian version of the wartime "walkie-talkie" system.

The camera-sized set is a two-way affair for sending or receiving which may be slung over the shoulder by a strap, slipped into a purse, or carried handily in the hand.

Every big radio-set manufacturer has been working on this gadget for the last two years, and FCC says quantity production may be expected in the near future.

Bodies of 3 World War II Vets Returned

Bodies of three World War II soldiers whose next of kin reside in Marion county are being returned to this country for reinterment, a U. S. army department announcement indicated Friday.

These names were included in the list of 3,900 remains brought from the Philippine Islands aboard the U. S. army transport Dalton Victory.

T. Sgt. Howard J. Larkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben C. Larkins of Salem, who was killed in action on Mindanao June 15, 1945.

EFC. Joe E. Matteson, whose next of kin was listed as Kelley Matteson, 3155 Cooke street, Salem.

S. Sgt. Omar S. Snyder, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. S. Snyder, Turner, who was killed in action on Leyte Nov. 30, 1944.

Other listed in the vicinity of Marion county are Second Lieutenant Harold L. Banton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Banton of Albany, who died Nov. 20, 1944, on Leyte of battle wounds received the day before, and Sgt. Frank R. Koltz, whose next of kin is listed as Bernita J. Koltz, Corvallis.

Negotiations in Cafe Dispute At Standstill

Only one Salem restaurant was picketed Friday as negotiations between the culinary alliance and cafe owners reached a standstill.

The Salem Hotel Coffee shop is the only one of Salem's eight largest downtown restaurants involved to be struck. Four union workers — two waitresses, a dishwasher and a cook — left their jobs Thursday. No union employees there stayed on the job.

F. K. Worth, proprietor of the business, said the coffee shop was being operated as usual by a crew of non-union workers. Owners of the other seven restaurants negotiating with the union said they would be able to remain open even if a strike is called.

Gertrude Sweet, Portland, international vice president of the alliance who arrived in Salem Friday to help negotiate the dispute, said late Friday afternoon that she had not yet met with the restaurant owners.

Miss Sweet said she was acquainting herself with the situation before taking action. She said negotiations were "standing still" at present, but said the union would take action within a short time.

Interim Board on Education of Blind To Present Report

The 1947 legislative interim committee to study care and education of the blind, meeting in Salem Friday, indicated it would have its report completed and ready to present to the governor within the next few weeks.

Sen. Allan Carson of Salem is committee chairman. The interim committee was created late in the last legislative session after a bill was introduced returning jurisdiction of the state school for the adult blind in Portland to the board of control. This institution originally was under the board of control, later was placed under a commission.

More state funds probably would be required from the 1949 legislature provided the recommendations of the committee received favorable consideration.

Daughter of Late J. K. Gill Succumbs

Mrs. Jessie Gill Hartman, 79, Salem born daughter of the late J. K. Gill, Portland bookstore owner, died in Portland Wednesday night. Funeral services will be held at 11 a. m. today at the St. Mark's Episcopal church. Interment will be in the Riverview cemetery.

Mrs. Hartman was born in Salem July 11, 1869. She was married to John L. Hartman in 1890. He died in 1925. Surviving are three sisters.

WU Gets Item From Estate Of Sculptor

A sculptured bronze piece from the estate of the late artist Arthur Putnam has been presented to Willamette university by George Putnam, trustee of the estate.

The sculptor's work, which will be placed on a special pedestal in the east wing of the university library's reading room, depicts a cougar and a serpent in conflict over a captured deer. It is entitled "Combat."

From 1905 to 1907 the late Mr. Arthur Putnam studied and worked in Rome and Paris. His creative work was accomplished in the first quarter of the century.

In 1915 he had 14 of his bronzes exhibited at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition at San Francisco where he was honored with a gold medal. There is a large collection of Putnam bronze at the California palace of the legion of honor in San Francisco and at the Fine Arts society in San Diego.

One of his most noted pieces is the Smiling Jaguar exhibited at the Metropolitan museum.
