The 1948-49 Look

Fashion Publication Gives Authentic Forecast of What's for Fall and Winter

Not that we claim to be expert at style forecasts, but we have some information on good authority about what's being worn this fall and winter.

Here it is, in brief, prepared partment of Woman's Wear Daily. New season's fashions are quieter and closer to the streamlined silhouette that American women have come to regard as their particular type. Oddly enough, the longer skirt, which caused all the hue and cry last year, is just as long and often longer. About 12 and 13 inches is the verdict generally, but there are afternoon and theater dresses that are 10 inches from the floor, and ankle-length dance dresses. There is a more forthright declaration for dresses are dresses, made in one piece and with no mistaking them for suits or anything else. In a general way, the costume of slim dress and widely flared, long coat should be regarded as typically 1948-49 fall and winter, say Women's Wear Daily's fashion editors. Uncertainty about coat lengths is removed. The majority are long enough to cover dresses, and with an inch or two to spare. This decision carries over into furs, though in that field the factor of price in terms of greater lengths of fur has prompted a healthy emphasis on the three-quarter length coat—about 36 to 40 inches. The biggest change this fall is the slimming down of skirts, especially for street wear. In place of the excessively wide sweeps skirts are around two yards wide at the hemline. Many look narrower than they actually are because they have a straight front and fullness panelled into the back in a disciplined stream of pleats or circular flare. The inverted pleat at back is a feature which can be seen in every possible type of garment, including fur coats. The natural shoulder, promoted for so many seasons, promises to "take" this year, judging by the almost unanimous adoption of it

by all designers. Reduced padding, or no pads at all, and seamless shoulders, are now endorsed. It is, in fact, this smaller shoulder that is very significant in measuring this year's silhouette, for with it have come narrower sleeves, smaller hats and hairdos (short bobs), thus accentuating the smaller top—above the waistline—for the silhouette. One other major 1948 new look is the town-country fashion. The simplifying of the silhouette, in conjunction with tweeds and knitwear, which have been so long out of the picture, revives the spectator sports type of dress or suit or coat, and with them, a completely new array of accessories. The reappearance of beautiful tweeds is only one aspect of the whole return of handsome fabrics, at their best when are available, as now, in terms of simple fashions. Silks in brocades of satin and taffeta, velvet, fancy wools in iridescent effects, novelty stripes and plaids, illustrate this new trend of fashions in fabrics. This season's schedule provides a fine selection of subtle darkish colors that have the same wearable tone of black, but with more individual appeal. Dark gray, dark green, brown, and a new winter navy, are among the good reliable daytime colors; dark gray goes into formal clothes and on a youthful basis.
