OCE to Offer Kindergarten Teacher Class

MONMOUTH, Aug. 14 — Inauguration of a kindergarten training program this fall at Oregon College of Education will make it possible for a student to secure an Oregon elementary school teaching certificate and a kindergarten certificate as part of the same program without having to attend an out-of-state school. Heretofore it has been necessary to recruit kindergarten teachers from Washington and California to staff Oregon schools.

The new kindergarten is designed to serve as a model for similar programs in the Oregon school systems. The room was designed cooperatively by the architects, teachers and administrators and will include heated floors, portable furniture, a covered play porch, private entrances, fireplace and private toilet facilities. The lighting, ventilating and heating are being designed in accordance with modern scientific findings.

Mildred Kane, assistant professor of education and present kindergarten and first grade supervisor at the college training school, will direct the new kindergarten. Miss Kane has been a kindergarten teacher in the Portland schools, served as director of in-service training in the federal nursery schools at Vancouver, Wash., and initiated the kindergarten program in that city. She has a master of arts degree in early childhood from Teacher's college, Columbia university, and is doing special kindergarten work with Prof. Roma Gans of New York at the present time.
