

New Drug Used To Aid Babe Against Cancer

NEW YORK, Aug. 16—(AP)—The New York Herald Tribune says Babe Ruth's death revealed he "played a dramatic role in one of the most exciting medical investigations of the generation."

Doctors tried to save the great baseball star's life with a drug, teroperin, the newspaper said. He was one of the first patients to receive injections of the drug and improvement in his condition at first was described as remarkable, the story added.

"His improvement gave the medical profession the world over hope that cancer could be combated successfully by the simple administration of a drug," the newspaper said.

Ruth's condition remained stable for several months after he received the injections but then his condition worsened and the hopes aroused by the drug faded, the Herald Tribune said.

Teroperin still is in the experimental stage and the lessons learned from its use "may provide valuable clues to the cancer problem," the Herald Tribune said, "but doctors cautioned that the drug must not be considered a cure for cancer."

Accused Red Quizzed by House Group

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16—(AP)—The house un-American activities committee investigating reports of communist spies in the government quizzed Alger Hiss for three hours today and reported it still doesn't know whether he or his accuser is telling the truth.

Hiss, former state department official, has been accused by Whitaker Chambers, an admitted ex-communist, of being a member of an "elite" communist movement in Washington in the early 1930s.

Hiss has denied it and testified that he never knew Chambers. Hiss was questioned in private today.

The committee set August 25 for Hiss and Chambers to come face to face with their contrary stories. Whether this session will be open to the public has not been decided, Chairman J. Parnell Thomas (R-NJ), told reporters.

Meanwhile, the committee's spy investigation will continue through subcommittees, with public hearings to be resumed September 7.

Fertilizer Output Probable Again By End of Month

Fertilizer production at the local plant of Columbia Metals Corp. probably will be resumed by the end of this month, it was forecast by plant officials Monday upon receipt of word that anhydrous ammonia soon will be shipped here.

Ammonia shortage closed the plant several months ago, but recent legislation by congress made available to three western fertilizer plants an allocation of ammonia from output previously earmarked for the U. S. army.

U. S. Sen. Wayne Morse wired Gov. John Hall yesterday that he had learned from the U. S. department of commerce that 110 cars of ammonia are being shipped west, with the Salem plant to receive 64 of the carloads.

One Arrested After Broadacres Fracas

A stabbing and fight Sunday over a rummy game at a tavern at Broadacres, north of Salem, brought about the arrest Monday of Nick Yashuk, Broadacres, on a justice court warrant charging assault with a deadly weapon.

Marion County Sheriff Denver Young reported.

Treated by Dr. Delbert Reed, Woodburn, following the affray was Elmer Wolf, Broadacres, who suffered flesh wounds over his heart, Sheriff Young said.

Yashuk is to appear in Woodburn justice court this morning at 10 o'clock to enter plea and is being held in Marion county jail in lieu of \$100 bail.

Wreck Injures Portland Woman

Maj. Fred Sven Ohrn, Salvation Army, Portland, was unhurt Monday night when his car left the road 1 1/2 miles south of Hubbard on highway 99E, state police reported.

Mrs. Ohrn suffered leg injuries, police said, when the car skidded and went into a roadside ditch. She was taken to Portland in a private car. The Ohrn car had considerable front end damage, police said.

Mother Will Follow Word Of Doctors

CHICAGO, Aug. 16—(AP)—A winning, blue-eyed baby girl will be examined by seven physicians Sunday morning to determine if an operation might correct deformity which otherwise may cost her life.

If the doctors' report is favorable, the child's mother, Mrs. Irene Lamphere, 21, will consent to the operation for her only child, little Pamela Frances, 22 months.

Otherwise, Mrs. Lamphere said she will not give permission for surgery aimed at replacing normally the baby's bladder, which now is outside her body.

In addition to the malformed bladder, little Pamela has no genital organs, Mrs. Lamphere's attorney, Charles C. Cooley, said.

The question of to operate or not to operate has estranged Mrs. Lamphere and Fred W. Lamphere, 23, the baby's father. Mrs. Lamphere has a divorce suit pending. The father went to court last week to seek an order compelling the mother to agree to an operation for the child.

Cyclists Required To Display Lights

WEST SALEM, Aug. 16—Bicycle riders at night are required by law to display lights on both front and rear of their bicycles, Chief of Police W. H. Porter reminded today.

He said young riders' carelessness he had observed recently amounts to a traffic hazard, although no serious bike-auto accident has resulted so far. The chief said the law on bike lights will be strictly enforced.

LOCATE MODEL FURNITURE

Mrs. John Huston, 1227 Court st., after reading of missing model furniture in a last week's Statesman, reported to city police Monday that she believed she had it stored in her home. The furniture, police said, was abandoned here by a demonstrator of the Dairy Diner company, "San Francisco, and was reported missing by L. Reymenandt, proprietor of the company, whom police have notified.

Pederson Silent On 'Resignation'

A. B. Pederson, secretary-treasurer of the Salem Culinary Alliance said "no comment" Monday night to a report that he was resigning his position with the union here.

He has recently been conducting strike negotiations between the alliance and Salem restaurant owners. No new developments in the strike situation occurred Monday, Pederson said.

Disabled Craft Sought on Coast

SEATTLE, Aug. 16—(AP)—The Cutter McLane searched tonight off the northern Oregon coast for the 41-foot fishing boat Akwe which was disabled by engine trouble.

Coast guard headquarters here said the Akwe, with two men aboard, estimated it was 50 miles south of the mouth of the Columbia river.

A patrol plane was dispatched to scan the area, but was turned back by heavy rains.

MRS. MAIN MISSING

James E. Main, 1935 Center st., reported to city police Monday night that his wife, Betty Main, 21, has been missing from home since Friday. She is described as being 5 feet 2 inches tall, weighing 117 pounds, having brown eyes and hair, and wearing a grey gabardine suit, with black accessories.

Santiam Crash Injures Pair

James Love, Vancouver, Wash., was in serious condition Monday night in Salem Memorial hospital, with a badly lacerated face and a possible skull fracture, following an accident on the North Santiam highway east of Detroit earlier in the day, hospital attendants reported.

The accident was thought to have occurred, a witness told hospital attendants, when Love momentarily dozed at the wheel. The car left the road and went over an embankment.

Clark White, of Portland, was also brought to the Salem hospital by Detroit ambulance and treated for a lacerated forearm and elbow, attendants said. An unidentified third man in the car was unhurt. The three men's wives were in a car ahead of one Love was driving and reported the accident.

National Guard Gets First Jets

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16—(AP)—The national guard now has its first jet fighter planes. Marking the gradual conversion of the air national guard from wartime planes, 15 Lockheed F-80C "Shooting Star" fighters have been delivered, ten to the 196th fighter squadron at San Bernardino, Calif., and five to the 173rd fighter squadron at Lincoln, Neb.

A total of 107 "Shooting Stars" are to be delivered to the national guard by the end of the year.
