North Marion Harvest Opens

WOODBURN—Hop picking began in the Woodburn area of north Marion county last week, some yards started on the early fuggle crop Monday, others on Thursday, while others growers started this week. Peak of local bean harvest is anticipated this week and harvest of evergreen blackberries is expected to be in full swing by the first of next week. Starting date for late hop harvest in this area has been set for September 1.

Larry Austin of Woodburn is operating the local branch of the farm labor office in the Masonic building, from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The office opened Thursday after closure between the berry harvest and the opening of the fall crop harvest.

Birds Eye-Snyder cannery is running three shifts of 268 men and women each on canning and freezing beans this week. The plant will start processing evergreen blackberries Monday.

Three new hop picking machines will go into operation in this area within the next few weeks. Joe Serres, Woodburn route 2, has a new stationary machine while Kilian Smith of Donald has a new portable outfit. Another portable machine has been delivered in the Mission Bottom vicinity.

The stationary machine weighs over 20 tons and the vines are hauled to the outfit in trucks. The portable machines travel through the hop yards like a combine and weigh about seven tons. The machines pick, clean and sack the hops.

New Construction at Fairview Home to Relieve Congestion



Completion of a children's cottage and three employes' cottages at Fairview home this month will relieve some of the congestion at the institution. Cottage Has 6 Wards Set for 90 Children

Occupancy within a month of the new children's cottage at Fairview home will allow entrance to the institution of 45 persons now making up the waiting list, according to Dr. Irvin Hill, institution superintendent.

The new cottage will have six wards, with baths, play rooms and dining facilities. Construction is several months in advance of the date set for occupancy and will set up financial problems, but the building will be put to immediate use, Dr. Hill said. Furniture already is being moved in, and the children will be moved in as soon as possible, being placed in the large, light, airy rooms according to age and classification.

At present there are 1,090 inmates, but the population of Fairview will be increased when the regular school term begins by about 150 children who have been with their parents during the summer vacation. The new children's cottage will accommodate 90 children, and three new employe cottages to be completed next month will house 48 employes now in existing dormitories. Thus some of the congestion will be relieved and those on the waiting list can be taken in.

Features of the children's cottage include bathrooms with lavatory and bathing fixtures scaled down to the size of the children for ready access. An elevated bath will permit bathing babies by attendants without the attendant's bending over. The six wards are arranged in a "T" shape so that a nurse standing at the central converging point can see what is going on in all wards at once. Each of the six play rooms has radiant heating tubes set in the floors so that the children playing on the floor will not be subject to cold drafts.

Two of the employe cottages are for married couples, with apartments of a living room, bedroom and private bath. The single nurses' cottage has one living-bedroom per person with a private bath and large closet. There are also personal laundry and lunch facilities.

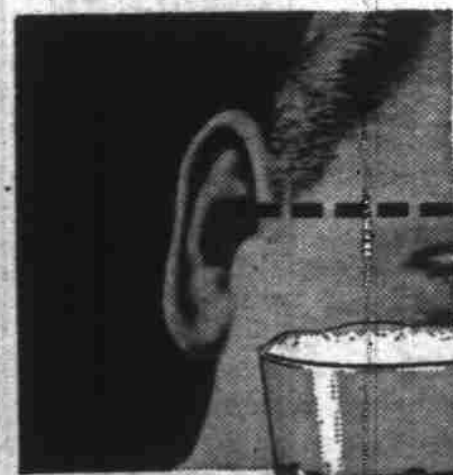
Mehama Homecoming Held at School House
