Cne of Cuban Bank Robbers Arrested

HAVANA, Aug. 17—(AP)—Police Monday announced the arrest of "one of the men who robbed a branch of the Royal Bank of Canada last Wednesday." They did not disclose his name.

They also announced that \$20,700 of the stolen money had been recovered. The robbery, staged by eight or 10 bandits, resulted in the theft of more than \$500,000. It was the biggest bank robbery in Cuba's history.
