Stock Demand On Increase

NEW YORK, Aug. 17—(P)—Demand for stocks perked up today, and the market's price level took the largest step ahead in two weeks.

The expansion in buying power was moderate at best, but it was enough to send leading issues forward by fractions to two points or so.

Volume increased to 690,000 shares, comfortably above the four-year low of 460,000 shares reached Monday.

The advance bore out predictions made lately by numerous observers in the financial district. They claimed that recent unusually low volume indicated the market had reached a sold-out condition. Selling of any importance had come to at least a temporary halt and thus the market generally, they reasoned, was in a position to respond to a modest pickup in demand. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced .8 of one point to 68.1. Trading in individual stocks broadened to 942 from only 856 yesterday. Of these, 616 moved up and 151 declined.

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Easy Tone in Grain Market

CHICAGO, Aug. 17—(P)—Grains carried an easy tone during the greater part of today's Board of Trade session and settled to the day's low at the close.

Price changes were not great. The session was built and without features.

At the close wheat was 1/4 to 1/2 lower than yesterday's finish, September \$2.22. Corn was 1/2 to 2 cents lower, September \$1.65 1/2-65. Oats were 1/4 to 1/2 lower, September 73 1/2-74. Soybeans were 2 to 3 1/2 cents lower, November \$2.58 1/2 and rye was 11 to 2 1/4 lower, December \$1.74 1/2.

There was little action in the wheat pit. Late in the session wheat eased with corn, after having held around the previous finish.
