

Teacher Given Transfusion; In Oxygen Tent

NEW YORK, Aug. 18 - (AP) - The teacher who jumped from a window of the Russian consulate and became the central figure in an international controversy was put in an oxygen tent and given a blood transfusion late today.

Critically hurt, Mrs. Oksana Stepanovna Kosenkina had been given several transfusions since she was taken to Roosevelt hospital after her fall. She has many broken bones and other injuries.

The hospital said she was put in an oxygen tent when her breathing became "somewhat labored" and her temperature rose to 103.4. Later the transfusion was administered.

The bulletin reporting the transfusion said she had a slight drop in temperature.

At 11 p.m. a bulletin from the hospital said Mrs. Kosenkina showed no marked improvement.

Her temperature, the bulletin said, was 103, and her pulse 104, both higher than at 8 p.m.

She was still in the oxygen tent, the hospital said, and had "slept for long intervals" during the evening.

Sec. Marshall Issues Stinging Rebuke to Reds

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 - (AP) - Stern words from Secretary of State Marshall today foretold a stinging American rebuke to Russia within 24 hours for pressing its pack of charges against the United States in the refugee school teacher cases.

At a news conference, Marshall appeared fed-up with the Soviet diplomatic and propaganda campaigns built around the cases of Mrs. Oksana Stepanovna Kosenkina and Mr. and Mrs. Michael Samarin, soviet citizens who don't want to go back.

The United States, he said, views with serious concern the Russian charges against this government and some of its officials involved in handling the refugee teachers. They have been promised U. S. protection.

The concern arises, Marshall said, from the fact that the state department by New York police authorities does not bear out the soviet claims.

Army Reserve Intelligence Unit Organized

Lt. Col. Mogan announced he would appoint a staff at the next meeting of the group at the same place on September 20. All military intelligence officers are invited to be present for the next meeting, he said.

against a proposed sustained yield timber agreement involving public and private timber in Oregon.

Judge John H. Biggs, Jr., third U. S. judicial circuit court of Philadelphia, threw the case out of court on the grounds that a contract has yet to be made and conditions feared by the lumbermen are conjecture.

The suit was filed by the Western Association of Lumbermen and Loggers and George E. Owen, Eugene, Ore., lumberman. It protested the proposed Mohawk river sustained yield agreement between the Lumber Co. of Marcola, Ore., and the department of the interior. The plan called for 100-year management of interlocking public and private timber in Linn and Lane counties.

The association and Owen contended the agreement gave Fletcher a monopoly on the timber, contrary to the anti-trust laws. Owen argued the plan also would deprive him of his livelihood and force him to close the mill and discharge his workers.

Truman to Cover Nation In Campaign

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 - (AP) - President Truman expects to be on the road most of the time between mid-September and the November election. His campaign will cover every section of the country.

This was disclosed by Senator J. Howard McGrath, democratic national chairman, late today after a two-hour White House conference with Mr. Truman.

The president will include the South in his speaking itinerary, McGrath said. Time will not permit his speaking in every state, but he will appear in every section of the nation.

McGrath's conference was his final one with Mr. Truman before the latter's departure Friday afternoon on a nine-day cruise. On that trip the president will work on his addresses and take a rest before launching into his campaign.

The president will formally open his bid for a term in the White House in his own right with a Labor Day speech at Detroit and five other addresses in Michigan the same day.

Dennis, driver of the car chased by police, was arrested on a charge of driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor, having void license plates, defective brakes and for failure to stop at the scene of an accident. The latter charge was placed against him, police said, when the car he was driving and one driven by Kenneth Potts, 339 Chemekeeta st., collided at 12th and Mission sts. There were no injuries and damage to the car was minor.

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Damage Suit Results from Child's Death

A \$10,000 damage suit was filed in Marion county circuit court Wednesday growing out of the death of Richard Dennis Stiles, 5, killed June 23 in a truck pedestrian accident at Cottage and State streets.

The complaint was brought by Stiles' mother, Mrs. Hazel Stiles of Salem, against Harold and Floyd Duncan of Idanha, owners of the truck which struck the youth as he was crossing State street. The truck, according to city police records, was driven by Harry Duncan.

The suit charges that the young Stiles was in an unmarked crosswalk at the time of the accident, the defendants failed to yield the right-of-way, drove at an excessive speed with defective brakes and failed to give proper warning. The Stiles boy died in a Portland hospital a few hours after the accident. Harold T. Duncan was arrested at the scene of the accident by city police for driving with defective brakes and was later fined \$10 in municipal court after pleading guilty.

Spy Probers To Increase Witnesses List

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 - (AP) The house un-American activities committee today called three more witnesses today to answer some of the new questions raised in the red spy investigation.

Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.) told reporters that three former government workers who knew accused Alger Hiss and accused Whittaker Chambers during the 1930's will be questioned here Friday and Saturday. All are from New York, he said. The hearings will be behind closed doors.

Nixon held an informal news conference on returning from New York, where he had spent the day talking to other witnesses. "Corroborative features of the case," he declined to identify the witnesses.

Chambers has sworn that Hiss belonged to a pre-war red underground in Washington. Hiss, also under oath - has denied it; said he isn't a communist and never has been.

Hiss is head of the Carnegie Foundation for International Peace.

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
