

Rogers, Sprague Named to Forest Advisory Board

Neis Rogers, Oregon state forester, and Charles A. Sprague, Oregon Statesman publisher, were appointed Friday to one-year terms on the advisory board for forest lands administered by the department of interior.

The two appointments complete the 17-member board which helps the interior department administer the sustained yield program for forests on 34,500,000 acres of reforested Oregon and California railroad grant land, reforested Coos Bay wagon road grant land, and other public lands in western Oregon.

The expanded board will meet in Portland September 1.

Commission Petition Check Progressing

Validation of initiative petitions seeking a November vote to replace the Salem city manager plan with a commission government is progressing satisfactorily, the Marion county clerk's office reported Friday afternoon.

Fifty-one petitions, containing 1,034 signatures were handed to the clerk's office Friday morning by Eva M. Rush, deputy city recorder. Mrs. Gladys White, county elections clerk, reported late Friday afternoon that more than 300 signatures had been checked, with only an average number of rejects appearing.

The unchecked petitions, along with 583 certified names, were handed to the city recorder's office before the August 18 deadline Wednesday afternoon. A total of 1,253 valid signatures are necessary to put the measure on the November 2nd ballot.

The remainder of the unchecked signatures—about 700—must be processed by the county clerk and city recorder's offices by 5 p.m. Monday, the August 23 deadline. Both offices indicated the job would be completed before that time.

Airline Denounces Price Increase

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20—(AP)—American Airlines denounced today a government-approved program for a 10 per cent increase in airplane fares and in effect challenged the government to force the boost.

At the same time, United Airlines announced it will offer a five per cent reduction on round trip fares when it raises its rates 10 per cent. This is in accord with an informal agreement reached yesterday in a conference of the civil aeronautics board with the 16 trunk airlines.

Lawyers Refuse To Testify in Red Activities Inquiry

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20—(AP)—The congressional spy probe hit new snags today. Three ex-New Deal lawyers refused to talk about an alleged pre-war communist underground in the government and a missing key witness remained unaccounted for.

The three non-talkative witnesses are Lee Pressman, John Abt and Nathan Witt. The "missing" witness is J. Peters, who is under bond awaiting hearing in a deportation case.

Pressman, Abt and Witt were questioned by Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.) on behalf of the committee behind closed doors this morning. Nixon announced later that they stood on their constitutional rights and refused to answer questions dealing with Chambers' charges or to say whether they knew of other alleged communists named by Chambers.

Exam Set in Hit-Run Case

Preliminary examination on charges of negligent homicide was set August 24 for Joseph W. Brown, Woodburn, held in lieu of \$2,500 bail, is charged with the hit-and-run death of 16-year-old Eugene Reedy, Portland, and critically injuring a brother, Ambrose Alvin Reedy.

The two youths were struck Wednesday night near Hubbard while bicycling home to the Eugene area. Ambrose Reedy was reported to be "holding his own" early Saturday morning in the Salem Memorial hospital.

Brown pleaded guilty Friday in District court to charges of being intoxicated on a public highway and was fined \$50 and costs.

Police had re-arrested Brown after noticing damage to the front end of his car.

Cafe Workers To Quit; Union Leader Quits

A. B. Pedersen, business agent of the Salem Culinary Workers union which voted to strike Salem restaurants last week, has resigned his position, it was announced Friday by Gertrude Sweet, international vice-president of the union.

Rumors of Pedersen's resignation were circulated late last week, but were not confirmed until Friday. Miss Sweet, currently engaged in contract negotiations with 12 of Salem's largest restaurants, did not explain why Pedersen had stepped out.

Miss Sweet also reported that the union membership would meet next Friday night to vote on a compromise wage proposal submitted by the employers this week. The offer, restaurant owners indicated, calls for an increase of about 5 cents an hour—approximately 1/2 the 10 cents requested by the union.

Meanwhile all restaurants involved in the dispute continue to operate normally, with most union workers remaining on the job. Pickets have been removed from the Salem Hotel Coffee shop, the only business actually struck after a walkout was called last Thursday.

Solons Guests Of Publishers; Program Told

(Story also on page 1) Incumbent senators and candidates for the senate and house from 13 northwest Oregon counties were the guests of the Oregon Publishers association at the Marion hotel last night. About 75 persons were present.

The meeting was called by Walter W. R. May of Oregon City, chairman of the publishers' legislative committee, to acquaint the legislators and prospective legislators with the association's position regarding restrictions on the press.

May said the publishers were asking neither for the repeal of present laws nor the involving of new ones, but merely wanted the legislators to consider three "rights" before taking future actions:

- (1) The right to advertise any goods or services lawfully available to the public so long as the advertising is truthful and of decent character.
- (2) The right to freely gather and report the news without interference.
- (3) The right to work or engage in lawful business, such as the sales and distribution of newspapers.

Phil Bladine, editor of the McMinnville Telephone Register, presided.

The meeting was arranged by Carl Webb, secretary-manager of the publishers association.

Flights to Shift To Portland

Scheduled flights of United Air lines DC-6s into the Salem field will return to the Portland airport August 23 as scheduled, airline officials said Friday night.

But it is expected that the big passenger planes may continue to use the Salem port when bad weather hinders operations from the Portland base. The three-a-day flights may return here during the winter months, local officials hinted.

The four-motored ships have been landing at Salem since the Portland airport was drowned out by the May 31 flood disaster. Following the flood, the full schedule of airline activity was shifted to Salem. All but the DC-6 schedules were transferred to Troutdale and McMinnville. Regular north and south-bound flights of UAL will continue to make four flights daily from the field.
