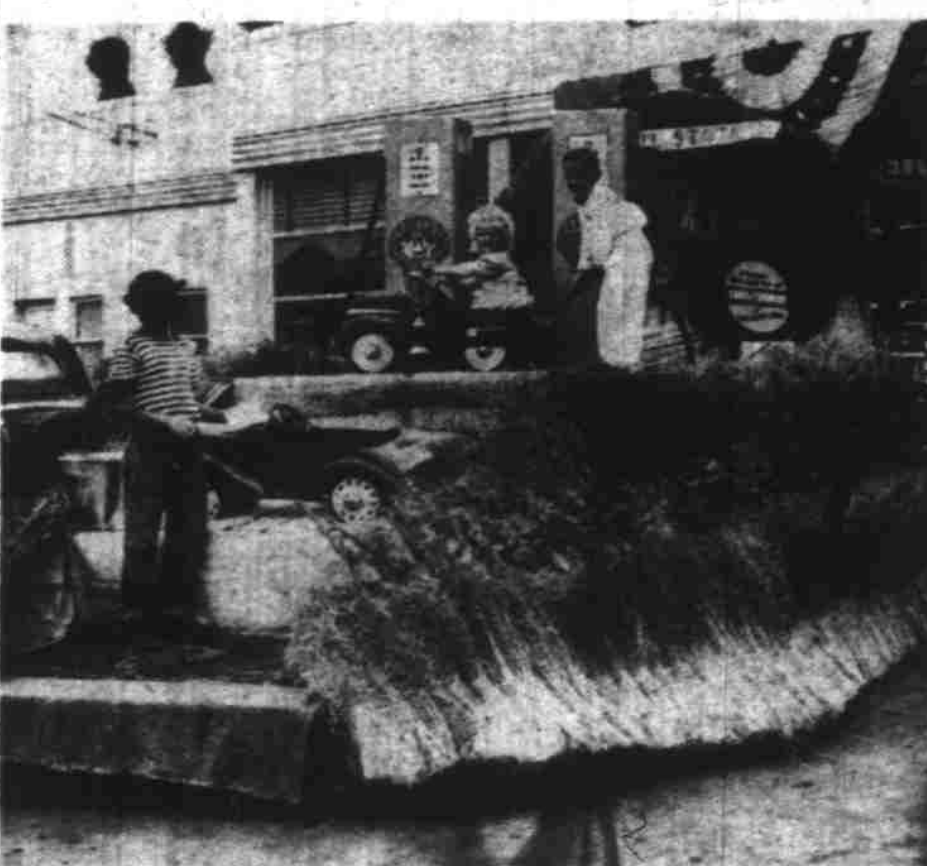

Weather Delays Bean Harvest Peak In Area's Fields

Recent cool weather delayed the expected peak in bean picking this week although harvesters are

still needed in the Stayton and Woodburn areas, the Salem employment service office reported Monday.

At least three weeks of bean harvesting remain, the office reported. Workers may obtain picking information at the Salem employment office or at a branch office in Stayton city hall.

Meanwhile picking of early hops in the Independence area is continuing with the late varieties not expected until early in September. Hop picker needs were described as "not critical" Monday but the demand is expected to increase when the harvest gets in full swing.
