

Crash Kills 16, Tail Gunner Rescues Buddy

HONOLULU, Aug. 25—(AP)—The air force told today how a tail gunner saved a buddy from certain death in the fiery crash of a superfortress which killed 16 airmen at Hickam field last night.

The tail gunner is Sgt. Donald Kienholz, Pasco, Wash., one of four injured survivors of the accident.

Thrown Clear
Kienholz, in the tail gunner's position, was thrown clear when the big bomber plowed into one of the field's power stations.

He then dashed into the flaming wreckage and dragged out Sgt. Harry C. Larsen, Los Angeles, another survivor.

The two, with Sgt. Francisco Billenbeck, El Paso, Tex., and PFC Halbert L. Pittman, California, Calif., were too seriously injured to be interviewed, the air force said.

How Billenbeck and Pittman escaped was not known immediately. Apparently they were thrown clear.

Ernie Quits
The giant bomber from the 98th bomber group at Spokane, Wash., had just taken off from Barber's Point bound for Okinawa when an engine quit.

The pilot was told to try to land at municipal airport, adjacent to Hickam field. The bomber missed the field and banked over Hickam to try again.

As it banked a wing of the bomber struck a parked transport plane. Eyewitnesses said the superfort crashed into the power station with a blinding flash of orange flame.

Rites Today for 3 Legislators

Funeral services for three of four state political leaders killed in Sunday's plane crash at Lake of the Woods will be held today at 2 p.m.

Final rites for Rep. Earle Johnson, Corvallis, will be held from the Warren-McHenry chapel in that city. State Rep. W. W. Chadwick and Douglas Yeater, who were at the lake when the tragedy occurred, will be honorary pallbearers at the service.

Services for Rep. John R. Snellstrom, Eugene, will be at the Veterans Memorial chapel in Eugene, and for H. H. Evans, Waldport, Lincoln county nominee for state representative, at the Carroll funeral home in Gresham.

Services for William H. Fluhrer, Medford, pilot of the craft and republican nominee for the state senate from Jackson county, will be held in Medford Saturday at 2 p.m.

Exchangites Eye Park Plan

The Salem Exchange club Wednesday took under advisement a proposal calling for development of a picnic and recreation area on an 18-acre tract on the West Salem side of the Willamette river.

The plan was submitted in a meeting of the club by Peery T. Buren, local attorney and club member. The land is an undeveloped area located between the Polk county bridge and the railroad span and would be leased from Paul Wallace, property owner.

Buren said such a park would give Salem a picnic area close to the heart of the city. The proposal was handed over the club's recreation committee, headed by Bob Gormsen. The committee will report back its recommendation at a later meeting.

Tax Collections Jump 7 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25—(AP)—Internal revenue collections jumped \$2,756,156,553 in the fiscal year ended June 30 over the previous year, the treasury reported today.

The summary showed that total receipts in fiscal 1948 totaled \$41,863,542,295 against \$39,108,385,741 in fiscal 1947, a rise of 7 per cent.

Comparative returns for the fiscal years 1947 and 1948 included: Oregon \$284,193,102 and \$316,843,555.

Plane Accident Summary Not Expected Soon

It probably will be considerable time before an official report involving the airplane crash which resulted in the death of four Oregon republicans at Lake of the Woods last Sunday, will be released, attaches of the state aeronautics board offices here announced Wednesday.

They said that William Bartlett, director of the local aeronautics board, had not returned from the scene of the accident where he and federal aeronautics officials were investigating the disaster. The investigators will not hold a conference in Salem as reported from Klamath Falls.

Killed in the crash were state representatives John Snellstrom, Eugene, and Earle Johnson, Corvallis, and H. H. Evans, Waldport, and William H. Fluhrer, Medford. Fluhrer was the republican nominee for state senator from Jackson county and Evans the republican nominee for state representative from Lincoln county.

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 25—(AP)—A civil aeronautics board representative said today there will be no public hearing into cause of the airplane crash in which four republicans were killed Sunday.

F. K. McKlveen, Washington, D. C., explained his investigation of the crash indicated there was nothing involved warranting taking public testimony.

**Car Shortage May
Cut Timber Output**

PORTLAND, Aug. 25—(AP)—A shortage of railroad cars may cut lumber shipments from west coast mills late this summer.

A West Coast Lumbermen's association official, H. V. Simpson, called the railroad car shortage "serious but not critical," and said he anticipated no mill shutdowns like those in 1947.

ADA to Chart Politics Course

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25—(AP)—The Americans for Democratic Action (ADA) announced today it will hold an enlarged national board meeting in Chicago Sunday to decide its role in the 1948 campaign.

Best guess among ADA leaders is they will endorse President Truman—or confine their support, through local chapters, to congressional candidates they regard as "liberty" and as meeting ADA requirements. The group opposed Mr. Truman's nomination at Philadelphia.

Leon Henderson, former OPA chief, is national chairman of the ADA.

Hall Proclaims Dates for Draft

Gov. John H. Hall Wednesday issued a proclamation directing registration under the peace-time selective service act between August 20 and September 17.

The registration dates are the same as those previously announced by federal selective service headquarters in Washington, D. C.

The governor urged all employers and agencies, state and local, to cooperate with the draft officials.

Marion county 4-H club members swarmed over the north end of the livestock buildings at the Oregon State fair grounds Wednesday morning as their annual fall fair got under way. Businesslike club members with scrub brushes and curry combs were busy during the morning hours readying their stock for the critical eyes of the judges.

Farm crops, garden and canning exhibits occupied the space near the center of the building where sheep pens were torn out during the state fair last year to make room for cattle.

Animals did not exactly arrive wrapped in cotton wool but two lambs were seen to arrive carefully wrapped in burlap to protect them from contact with the truck.

The club stock were placed in snowy white pens, pens which will probably not be so white again until next summer's renovation in preparation for the 1949 fair. The white of the fences and gates was rivaled only by the snowy white rabbits in the club exhibits.

Judges were at work Wednesday afternoon and will take over again to finish some time late this afternoon or Friday. The show will close with the livestock sale Friday night under the lights. Salem Lions club is sponsoring the sale which is expected to draw livestock buyers from throughout the Willamette valley, as it has in the past.

Polk county 4-H club exhibits will be a large part of the Polk county fair which opens today at Monmouth, while Yamhill 4-H FFA fair opens today in McMinnville.

Blast Furnace Sale Protested By Steel Firm

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25—(AP)—Charles M. White, president of the Republic Steel corporation, declared tonight his firm got "a stinking deal" when a \$23,000,000 (M) government-owned Cleveland, O., blast furnace was transferred to the Kaiser-Fraser corporation.

Testifying before congressional committee investigating the transaction White banged the table and shouted:

"I resent to the very core the dirty damn things said here today by those dirty damn bureaucrats."

He said that his company had lost "hundreds of thousands of dollars" over the last few years supplying its customers with pig iron and were going to continue to supply them "until this deal came along and pulled the rug from under us."

Jess Larson, war assets administration director, testified earlier that Republic had threatened to shut the plant down when negotiations with that firm failed. He said he awarded the lease "to keep the furnace going."

Republic's lease on the furnace expires August 31, after which Kaiser-Fraser will take over operations under terms of a 20-year lease still subject to final approval by the government.

White took the stand before the senate small business committee and a house executive expenditures subcommittee to give Republic's version of its unsuccessful negotiations with WAA.
