## Red Sox Regain First Place; Braves Drop Pair to Chicago

### Going Great



Boston Red Sox second baseman Bobby Doerr, a native of Ilwaco, Ore., during the off-season, Thursday smacked a three-run homer and handled faultlessly his 356th chance in 65 games to help the Sox regain first place in the American league by virtue of their 8-4 win over Cleveland.

Unassuming, workmanlike Bobby Doerr, whose fielding is approaching a record, proved once again Thursday he is a dangerous man with a bat as his three run homer guided Boston's Red Sox into first place in the American league with an 8-4 triumph over Cleveland. The loss dropped the Tribe into second place by half a game.

The New York Yankees advanced to within a single game of the lead by downing Chicago, 6-2, and the Philadelphia Athletics kept pace with a 4-3 win over Detroit on Pete Suder's two-run double in the eighth. Ed Stewart's squeeze bunt brought Washington an 8-7 win over St. Louis.

The lowly Chicago Cubs tossed a bombshell into the National league race by downing the leading Boston Braves, 5-2 and 5-1, for their first doubleheader win of the season. The losses dropped the Braves to a lead of 2 1/2 games over St. Louis Cardinals, who took over second place with two wins over New York. Stan Musial's 52nd homer of the season broke a 5-5 tie in the ninth and enabled the Cards to take the second game of their twin bill with the Giants, 7-5. The Cards had also won the first game, 7-2, to snap a New York win streak of six games and drop the Giants back into fifth place. Brooklyn humbled Cincinnati for the 14th time in 17 games, 6-1, on Lefty Joe Hatten's flinging Pittsburgh regained fourth place with two wins over the Phillies, 4-1 and 11-4.
