

New Dean at Willamette 'Sold on West'

Dr. Robert D. Gregg, Willamette university's new dean of the college of liberal arts, already sold on the northwest's "fresh air, good housing, natural beauty and friendliness," he said Thursday. Dean Gregg assumed his new duties this week after 17 years in the history department at Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh, Pa.

He and Mrs. Gregg are awaiting arrival of their household goods from their former home, so that they may occupy a residence at 955 Marion st.

Gregg is Willamette's first dean of liberal arts since Dr. Chester A. Luther resigned two years ago to devote full time to teaching mathematics at Willamette. The work has been assumed principally by Pres. G. Herbert Smith and Dean of Students Lawrence Riggs.

Dr. Gregg told The Statesman he is looking forward to the great opportunity of the smaller school for more "intimate and definite contact between professor and student," which he deems best for basic education. He praised also the spiritual quality provided on the church-related campus, which he said makes for character-building.

The change from Carnegie Tech, which has a student body about three times as large as Willamette's, was made principally because of the advancement to administrative work and its opportunity and because of the climate.

Here he will teach at least one course, concerning recent international relations, in the history department, in addition to the administrative duties.

John Hopkins Doctorate

Gregg received his bachelor of arts degree from Oberlin college in 1923, master's at University of Michigan, taught at Friends seminary in New York City from 1925 to 1928, earned his doctorate at John Hopkins university in Baltimore in 1931. Since then he has been at Carnegie Tech, serving the past 13 years as head of the history department and acting head of the department of general studies for the past two years.

Dr. Gregg was active in civic enterprises in Pittsburgh, where he served as co-chairman of the Regional Inter-American center, chairman of that city's branch of the Foreign Policy association and moderator of a radio town meeting program for high school and college students. He is a member of the Hickside Friends church, American Historical association and Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Kappa Phi honoraries.

West German Meet Forms Constitution

FRANKFURT, Germany, Aug. 26-(AP)—The Frankfurt radio said this week, a German constitutional convention has completed drawing up a constitution for the west German state.

The constitution will be submitted to the west German parliamentary council at Bonn Sept. 1 for ratification, the radio said.

One of the proposals of the convention was that an "allied high court"—which would include German representatives—be formed to deal with differences between the western occupying allies and German authorities.

A-Plants Must 'Breed' Fuel, Scientist Says

SPOKANE, Aug. 26-(AP)—The atomic power plant of the future will be a "bootstrap proposition," a nuclear specialist reports.

Bruce R. Prentice, a member of the staff of the vice president and general manager of the General Electric company nuclear division, said "perhaps the most important criterion of a major atomic power plant of the future will be its ability to 'breed' more new fuel than it burns."

A successful atomic power plant, Prentice said, instead of just using up the world's supply of fuel, would add new fuel at the same time it was releasing useful energy.

To do this he said, the plant would have to create fissionable material from uranium 238 or thorium.

"However, neither of these is now fissionable or useful as fuel and they are vastly more abundant than the only natural atomic fuel, rare uranium 235," he said.

"So in a very real sense, breed-

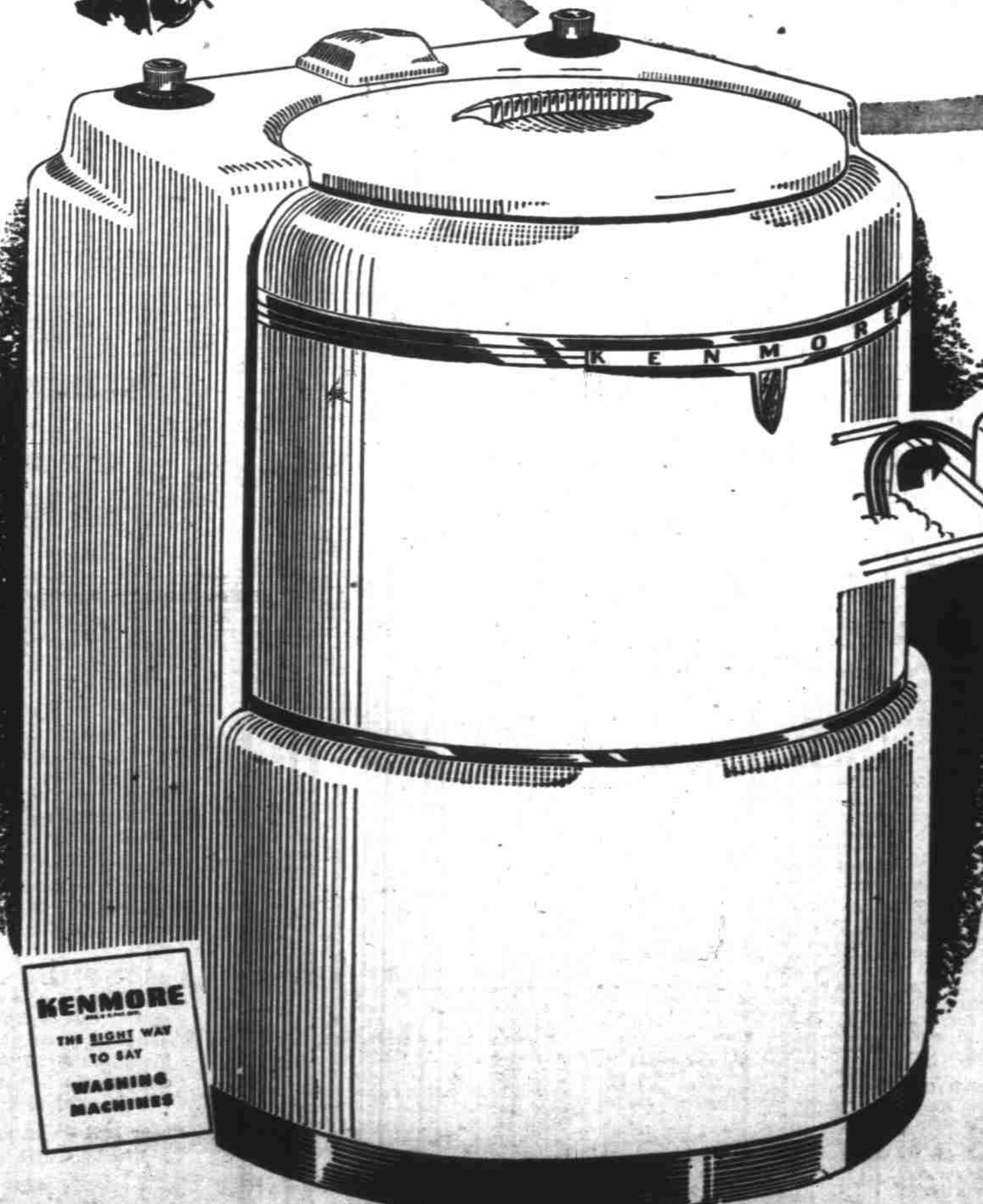
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
