

Henry Wallace Splattered By Ripe Tomatoes, Raw Eggs

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace was booted long and lustily at a ball park here tonight after being splattered with ripe tomatoes and raw eggs in three other North Carolina towns.

An estimated 2,500 persons -- about three-fourths negroes -- braved intermittent downpours to cheer and jeer the progressive party's presidential nominee.

In a continuation of the hostile reception he has received at nearly every appearance in the state, Wallace spoke with difficulty to the accompaniment of continuing boo's and constant heckling.

"We are progressive," Wallace said, "because we put the man first."

A dozen uniformed policemen and numerous detective patrolled the ball park to guard against any repetition of the egg and tomato throwing that took place at Burlington, Greensboro and High Point earlier in the day.

Miss Mary Price, the party's gubernatorial nominee, could not be heard above the boo's and catcalls as she introduced the former vice president.

Two separate chants of "down with Wallace" and "we want Wallace" were started when he began to talk against big business.

Gov. Gregg Cherry of North Carolina castigated the violence shown Wallace in North Carolina and Charlotte's Police Chief Frank Littlejohn promised jail for anyone hurling anything at Wallace in Charlotte tomorrow.

Police at Burlington said they did not know who tossed the missiles from a throng of 2,500 on the main street. After two attempts to complete his address Wallace stepped into an automobile and drove off to Greensboro. Two tomatoes and one egg struck the former vice president at Burlington.

The barrage at Greensboro was heavier when he sought to speak at the Guilford county courthouse. When a few missiles splashed near him he smiled. But he turned angrily upon his audience when others struck him about the head and body.

"I don't mind being hit by eggs and tomatoes," he cried, "But they would be more useful being fed to children."

Wallace, his white shirt splattered with yellow and red, continued amid boos and catcalls: "The faces I have seen distorted by hatred are of people for whom I have in my heart profound compassion because most of them have not had enough to eat."

Laughter and more pooing again interrupted him there.

Voices from the audience broke in frequently with yells such as "rave on Joe," "there are white people out here," and "back to Moscow."

Wallace who started his three-day campaign trip into North Carolina before an egg-tossing crowd at Durham last night, wound up his second day with an appearance (at 8:30 p. m.) here at southside baseball park.

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State Cops Continue Hunt For Escapees

State police Monday night continued their search of the Turner and Jefferson areas where an escaped convict was reported roaming after a suicide attempt last week.

The hunted escapee is Bert Blythe, 54, who escaped from the state prison farm five miles southeast of Salem August 10 with Cecil Wolter. Wolter returned to the prison last Thursday, tired and hungry after 16 days in the woods near the annex.

The search for Blythe was intensified Sunday after Wolter told prison authorities Blythe attempted suicide by slashing his throat with a razor blade several days before he gave himself up.

Wolter said Blythe had recovered from his wounds the day of his return to prison and indicated he would attempt to flee to California. Late Monday night state police were called to the Jefferson area when residents reported a mysterious prowler, but found nothing.

Indiana Guard Alerted for Duty at Plant

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Aug. 30.—(AP)—The Indiana national guard was alerted tonight for possible duty when the strikebound Bucyrus-Erie reopens tomorrow morning.

Two persons were hurt and 27 arrested in picket line clashes last Saturday.

Brig. Gen. Howard Maxwell, state adjutant general, announced in Indianapolis that he has alerted several guard units on a standby basis to aid state police if necessary.

CIO-United Electrical Workers called the strike last July 30 after the excavating machine company announced it would not negotiate with "a communist-dominated union." It employs 1,100 men.

Saturday's disorders occurred when foremen tried to enter the plant to prepare for its reopening.

Three Polio Deaths Ups Outbreak Total

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Three more infantile paralysis deaths today raised the total for Los Angeles county to 52 since the poliomyelitis outbreak started.

The county general hospital reported that 18 new patients were admitted today and 19 discharged. The hospital now has 272 polio patients confined, 32 of them in respirators.

Louisiana Longs Get Poll Testing On Senate Post

BATON ROUGE, La., Aug. 30.—(AP)—The heirs of Huey Long get an endorsement or a defeat at the polls tomorrow.

Russell Long, 29-year-old son of the late Huey Long and a nephew of Governor Earl Long, is running for the United States senate, where his father held forth in oratory in former years.

A heavy vote in the democratic primary is expected to reflect the record 1,000,000 voter registration. Democratic nomination is equivalent to election in Louisiana.

Russell Long is opposed by Appeals Judge Robert F. Kannon of Minden, La., who was defeated by Earl Long for governor.

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Red Cross Leaders Set Plans For Regional Blood Bank Center

Red Cross representatives and civic leaders from 18 Oregon and Washington counties met in Portland Monday to lay preliminary plans for establishing a regional blood distribution center in Portland.

Six members of the Marion county Red Cross chapter attended the session, the first of three which will end September 1.

They were Susan Flaherty, chapter manager; Marion Lowry Fischer, public information chairman; Mrs. Ronald E. Jones, board secretary; Mrs. Chester M. Cox, volunteer services chairman; Mrs. Ernest Arneson, director of nursing service; and Milton L. Meyers, board member and head of the county's blood donor service during the war. Dr. Ralph Purvine, Salem, represented the county's medical profession.

Counties represented at the session are located in northwest Oregon and southwest Washington. The Portland center will be one of many being organized throughout the nation at the request of civic leaders and the medical profession.

The agency would serve as a distributing point for blood collected from the 16 counties by mobile donor units. The units would rush the blood to Portland where it would be typed and rushed back to hospitals in the regional area. The American Red Cross, it was explained, in serving as a coordinating agency in establishing the units over the country.

Local representatives reported the plan will probably be put into operation by November 1. The Marion county chapter is expected to start work on its part of the project at its next board meeting on September 13.

Under the donor plan, Marion county's quota will be 85 pints of blood a month. The blood will be collected by the mobile units, rushed to Portland for typing and an equal amount returned to hospitals of the county. The blood collected will be contributed free of charge wherever needed.

Other regional distribution centers will be established in Yakima, Wash., Boise, Idaho, and Helena, Mont.

Gerald Wade Named To Fill Party Vacancy

TOLEDO, Ore., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Gerald Wade, secretary of the port of Newport commission and a Newport insurance man, was named today to be the Lincoln county republican candidate for legislative representative.

Wade was named to fill the vacancy in the party ticket caused by the death of H. H. Evans in a plane crash in Klamath county.

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Three Caesarian Births in 2 Years Misses Record

MILWAUKEE, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Mrs. Althea Phillips, 25, went through her third successful caesarian operation in 23 months today. And, for the third time, it was a boy.

Both mother and son were reported in "fine condition" by Dr. F. L. Evans.

The older sons, James, 23 months, and Daniel, one year, also are in good health.

Their father, J. W. Phillips, is a dry cleaning route salesman.

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
