

# 'Slow' Plane Triumphs

CLEVELAND, Sept. 6-(P)-Anson L. ("Johnny") Johnson surprised himself and 80,000 others at the National air races today by winning the Thompson trophy and \$16,000 first prize. It was a dull but delightfully safe climax to the three day pro-

gram of speed, stunts and show of military might. The military put on the best show ever offered at a sporting event, including an unofficial world speed mark of 669 miles an hour. Seven of the ten starters in the Thompson-the classic of closed
