Detroit-Idanha Deputy Sheriff Virtually Assured by County

A regular Marion county deputy sheriff to patrol daily the Detroit-Idanha area is virtually assured, Marion County Sheriff Denver Young reported Monday.

Marion county has promised to supply a car for the new deputy's duty. All that remains to be done, Sheriff Young said, is to find a satisfactory man to fill the job.

The county court agreed to purchase the needed auto as soon as possible at a meeting Monday morning with a group of residents from Detroit and Idanha. The court and Sheriff Young sat down with the citizens and discussed the problem of additional law enforcement in the east end of the county. Petition for an additional deputy in the Detroit-Idanha district was made to the county court several months ago because of the greatly increased population of that district.

Tentative plans, Sheriff Young said, are to send a deputy out on daily patrol through that district during the early evening and night. The deputy would work out of the sheriff's headquarters in Salem.

C of C Studies Hospital Fund Raising Plans

Salem Chamber of Commerce directors were advised Monday that local hospitals seeking federal funds should apply as soon as the local matching money is available or pledged.

The board discussed hospital matters at noon yesterday with Dr. George M. Shiffer of the state board of health who noted that more than 40 per cent of federal aid funds available for Oregon already has been applied for by Oregon communities.

Oregon was earmarked for \$535,815 over a five-year period, with an out last year. The federal government will match half the funds put up by eligible hospitals and both Salem hospitals are eligible, Dr. Shiffer said.
