Indian Summer

Fall Vegetables Are Found Among the Best of All the Year for Interest

Fall vegetables are among the very nicest of all the year. Cabbage, while in the markets all the time, is especially appreciated in fall. Here's an unusual recipe for dressing for cole slaw which contains molasses. We've never tried it, but the molasses people vow it's good.

COLE SLAW SUPREME
2 cups shredded raw cabbage
1 cup shredded raw carrots
1 cup finely sliced celery
1/2 cup green peppers, finely chopped

Toss all ingredients together and combine with desired amount of Piquant French Dressing. Serve with or without cottage cheese.

MOLASSES FRENCH DRESSING
1/2 cup oil
1/4 cup vinegar
1 tablespoon grated onion
1/2 cup New Orleans molasses
1 teaspoon salt
Few drops Worcestershire sauce

Combine all ingredients and shake thoroughly.

Green peppers are now at the lowest price they'll be during the year, and using them frequently is good business.

FLAKED FISH STUFFING
(for green peppers)
4 medium green peppers
1 1/2 cups flaked fish (tuna, salmon or other)
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons chili sauce
1/4 cup cooked rice

Turn pepper shells upside down to drain. Melt butter, add flour, cook until well combined. Add milk, cook slowly, stirring constantly until thickened. Add salt, pepper, fish, chili sauce and rice. Toss together using fork to prevent mashing rice and fish. Fill peppers, sprinkle tops with bread crumbs. Place in baking pan; bake in hot oven 400 degrees F. about 20 minutes or until tops are brown.
